OLD SCOTS COLLEGE OPPOSES SEPARATION

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland, July 19.—(CP)—Graduates of the University of St. Andrews, founded more than five centuries ago, have voted in a plebiscite against proposed separate university status for Dundee, 12½ miles to the northwest.

The question is under study by a special committee. Dundee University College has been part of St. Andrews since 1897. The graduates voted 2,350 to 1,000 against separation in a mail ballot. The University court and senate also are opposed to it.
