ARE YOU HOT? CONCENTRATE AND YOU'LL BE MUCH COOLER

TORONTO, July 15—Concentrate. Just think it's cool, and you will be cool. At least that, in part, is the theory of Dr. L. A. Pequegnat, deputy-medical officer of health. Mental attitude, he said, has a great deal to do with it. "Too many people fume and get flustered about the weather, instead of taking things calmly. The more one does to create the illusion of being cool the more comfortably they will feel," he said. The time-worn phrase "it's not the heat, it's the humidity," has a lot of truth in it, he said. The lower the moisture content of the air, the higher the rate of evaporation, and evaporation creates coolness. While clothing deflects heat, black absorbs it, he said, settling another contentious point. "Is it logical to put heat into the body to lose heat?" he said, when queried about the cool or hot drink dispute. Cold drinks, however, should not be too cold, just cool. PAPUAN PLANTERS GROWING RUBBER

CANBERRA, July 15—The Lieutenant-Governor of Papua, Sir Herbert Murray, in his annual report to the Australian Government, forecasts an increasing prosperity in the rubber plantations in the territory. He states that while copra has slumped from \$100.00 a ton to a disastrously low price of \$40.00 a ton the price of rubber has risen, and it is now 12c a lb. or, with the Australian preference, 15c a pound. The Commonwealth Government is being asked to provide a permanent bounty of 4c a pound instead of the existing preference. If this bounty is granted, rubber cultivation in Papua and New Guinea will have every prospect of success, as it should enable the planters to control the Australian market.
