## CORN HINTS

Put your time on the curing and you will not see to put much on the testing. Put a "corn tree" in the parlor, it will make a good decoration. Where corn is kept in a dry room, or is fire dried, it gives a test of 98 to 100 per cent. germination, but where left shocked in the field or on the standing stalk throughout the winter the test was 0. Corn should not be dried in the direct rays of the sun. Breeding grains and forage plants so naturally hard in hand. It isn't always the ear that scores the highest that gives the highest yield. Fire-drying corn shortens the ears as much as 1/2 inches.
