PROTECTING THE SULTAN.

According to a report in one of the foreign papers, about the only members of the Turkish army who are well paid and who actually get their money are those intrusted with guarding the personal safety of the Sultan. Abdul Hamid always fearful for his life, has no less than eight generals in his private guard, two of whom are on duty each night, with a colonel, a major, a captain and a force of some fifty men. The greatest care was taken in selecting these officers and privates, and the salaries paid are far in excess of what is given in other branches of the service. It is stated that each of the two generals on guard receives fifty pounds (Turkish) a night. The colonel is paid forty, the major thirty-five, the captain thirty and each man at least a pound. A pound Turkish is worth about \$4.40, so that on this basis it would cost about \$1000 a night to guard the Sultan. We admit that the figures appear to be so large that one may question the truth of the story. On that point we can only say that we believe they were originally published in Pro Armenia, and have since been quite widely copied in English and French papers.

THE ALASKAN COMMISSION.

No one who has any authority to speak for Canada has criticized the composition of the British side of the Alaska Commission which is now sitting in London. What the Canadian press has criticized is the composition of the American side, points out the Toronto Globe. Each of the American commissioners is in active politics, and each of them knows that a desertion from the American view, in the smallest degree, would end his career forever. Indeed, The New York Times advised them never to come back to this side of the ocean if they rendered a decision adverse to the American view.

We feel sure that those presenting the Canadian evidence have not the least hope of influencing or convincing the American commissioners. Their only hope is to secure disagreement. Had the Americans appointed a man of the judicial standing of Lord Alverston, the commission would have been more like a real tribunal than it is now. As to Lord Alverston, we feel sure that Canadians generally will have the utmost confidence that he will decide in accordance with the evidence placed before him. As to the suggestion that his Lordship will be swayed by political rather by juridical considerations, it must be said that to entertain such an idea would be to take a low estimate of Lord Alverston's character, and that, we are sure, no Canadian who is acquainted with the situation is likely to do.

The Lake St John Railway Company, in pursuance of a most vigorous colonization policy, is circulating a pamphlet and map descriptive of the district it serves. Some years ago the company not only decided to carry bona fide settlers free for cost, but organized during the harvest season a series of farmers' excursions to which, every year since, each parish in the Province was authorized to send two delegates to report upon the country. The result of this policy has been to make the Lake St. John valley known throughout the Dominion and to attract to it great numbers of farmers, many of whom have bought land and settled there. This year two of those farmers' excursions have so far been held, and three more are fixed for September and October. The first of these was attended by about 600 farmers, gathered from all parts of the Province, from Gaspe to Pontiac. The second had over 300 in attendance.

At the Museum of Natural History in New York there is on exhibition a tiny glass tube containing about two grains in weight of the newly discovered substance called radium. In appearance it is a gray powder. It is not pure radium, but a compound called radium bromide. It is the largest quantity now in this country, and cost \$300. This sample was purchased through the generosity of Edward D. Adams for experiments by Dr. Charles Baskerville of the University of North Carolina and George F. Kunz the curator of gems at the museum, who have been conducting experiments with diamonds. It is known that when certain gems are exposed to the X-ray or to the ultra-violet they will glow with a phosphorescent light for some moments afterwards. Radium produces a similar effect. Nobody yet understands the reason of it. This substance radium is derived from a mineral named pitchblende. A ton of it was used to produce the two grains of radium. The substance was discovered in 1900, and it has marvellous properties, which some think may be useful in curing certain diseases.

GIRL TOOK PARIS GREEN.

Hamilton, Sept. 12.—Rachael Buck, a pretty 19-year-old cook, employed at the American Hotel, is very sick from a dose of Paris green. The only reason she gives for taking the poison is that her brother tried to force her to go back to St. Thomas. The doctors hope to pull her through.
