GERMANS REPORT UNDERSEA REEF

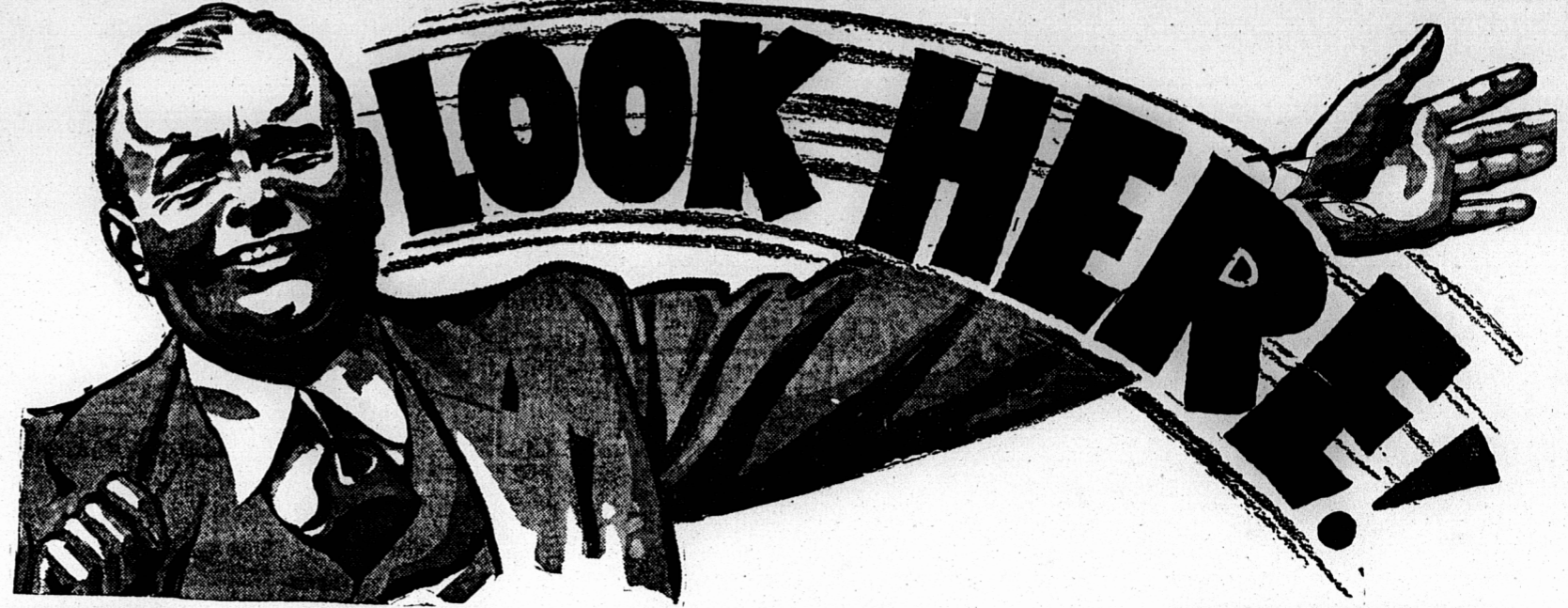
BERLIN, Aug. 10 (CP-Reuters) -A new sand bank, approximately 40 by 20 miles in size, has been discovered in the Atlantic Ocean, west of the Canary Islands, by the Meteor, hydrographic ship of the German Navy. The bank, which rises from a depth of about 1,500 feet to about 810 below the surface, has been named the "Great Meteor Bank." The Meteor has just returned after a six-and-a-half-month survey of the ocean floor between Cape Verde and Canary Islands.
