Dorothy Dix's Letter Box

Shall This Young Woman Leave Her Husband to Please Her Mother?—Curing Sensation Hunter. Straight Talk to Mother Who Would Shirk Her Job.

DEAR DOROTHY DIX—I am married to a man whom I love dearly and who loves me, and is good and kind and considerate to me. But my mother hates him and is trying in every way to make me leave him and come back to her. She says that I will never be happy with him, but would if she would just let me alone. She says that if I will come to her, he will take care of my baby so that I can go to work in an office and have my own money to spend and be able to go and come as I please. And she says that if I don't leave my husband she won't have anything more to do with me.

I don't want to give up my home and my husband. Must I do so to please my mother?

MRS. T.

Answer: I should say not. Your first duty is to your husband and, as long as he is good and kind to you, you have no just cause for leaving him. Nor have you a right to deprive your baby of a father's love and care.

Furthermore, if you leave the husband you love just to please your mother, you will be a most unhappy woman and bitterly regret it. Mother love isn't going to take the place of a husband's love, and you will find rightly little pop in mother's society compared to the companionship of your husband. More than that, no woman who has been at the head of her own house is ever satisfied to slip back into the subservient place of a daughter who has no authority in the household and must do as she is bidden.

And to your surprise you will find that if you give in to your mother and do as she wants you to do, she will not be overjoyed to have you at home. As soon as she has accomplished her purpose of breaking up your home and separating you from your husband, she will begin to pity herself for having you thrown back on her hands and for having to take care of the baby, and she will make things very unpleasant for you. It was only the prodigal son for whom the fathered calf was killed. When the prodigal daughter returns home there isn't so much as a veal cutlet cooked up for her.

Your mother is one of the bossy, rule-or-ruin women, who are bound to dominate every one with whom they come in contact, no matter how much trouble they bring about. Unfortunately, the type is not rare, and from this class is recruited the multitude of mothers-in-law who make the lives of their own children, and of their children's husbands and wives, a burden by their tyrannies, and who bring about more divorces than all other causes combined.

A mother is justified in trying to keep her daughter from marrying a man of whom she disapproves if she is convinced that he has serious defects of character, but after the girl is married to the man of her choice it is the mother's duty to keep silent concerning his faults and to try to make her daughter satisfied with her bargain.

No woman who really loves her daughter and desires her happiness will ever criticize her husband. She will praise rather than blame him, and she will urge her daughter to keep her home together instead of trying to break it up. I strongly advise you to tell your mother that you will not leave your husband and to implore her not to make trouble between you. She is certainly taking a bitter way to wreck her spite on your husband when she is willing to sacrifice you and your child to her enmity.

Answer: I am afraid that telling your father wouldn't do very much good. He would forbid her to do it, and that would probably make her all the more determined to do it. She would get an extra kick out of it on account of its being a bit more dangerous, hence a greater adventure.

Why don't you tell her that, if she is so anxious to find out how it feels to be drunk, she had better try her experiment at home, where she will at least have privacy and not furnish a spectacle for the whole mob. For there is no other sight on earth so utterly disgusting as that of an intoxicated woman staggering around with babbling maudlin inanities, crying, or laughing, or swearing, with all self-control lost.

I think that if your sister will stage her drunken orgy at home, she will find few compensating thrills in it, and when she wakes up the next morning with a splitting headache and a dark brown taste in her mouth she will be ready to sign the blue-ribbon pledge. PARIS, October 26.—A new fashion of trimming off the edges of large ears is keeping the Paris beauty doctors busy these days. "I have a constant stream of people coming to me who prefer to have small-fitting ears," Dr. Raymond Passot, a noted French face surgeon said the other day.

"For example, a good actor was always forced to play villain or Apache characters because he had large ears that stood out. He came to me and explained that he wanted to play the role of a successful business man with a handsome, refined face. I cut off a bit of cartilage, and now his ambition has been satisfied."

"You have no idea how many moving picture players of both sexes patronise the beauty specialists. There is hardly a single one who has not some defect—prominent nose, large mouth, wrinkles or lumps. These defects show up plainly on the screen, especially in close-ups."

"There is one French producer who sends all his actors and actresses to me to have their facial faults corrected, and I am able to do it in about half the cases. Some of the greatest beauties are manufactured ones."

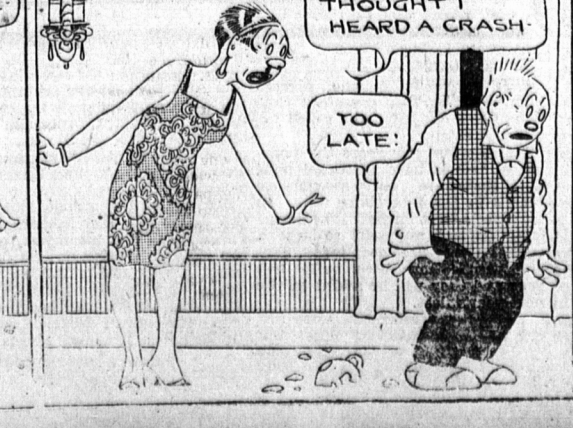
