THAT CAR OF YOURS

This is a series of articles pertaining to maintenance and repair of your Automobile. We will be glad to answer through this column questions regarding your car or its mechanism.

You buy your car with the idea in mind that at some future time you will dispose of it and get another one. The price you get for your car when you trade it in or sell it will depend entirely upon its condition.

A car costs perhaps in the neighborhood of \$1100; a piano costs perhaps \$500. Ask yourself the question. Do you give the former the proportionate care that you give the latter, knowing that the investment in the Automobile is more than twice that of the piano?

The primary assets to high resale value of a car, is cleanliness and lubrication.

Be fair to your car, use it—don't abuse it. Car, when the engine is idling the head lights are normal; if I race the engine the lights brighten to a considerable degree, and has burned out two or three lamps. What would be the cause of this?—A. M.

A. M.—Look for high resistance in the charging circuit of your car. Namely:—Loose connections, dry battery, shorted battery cells, third brush regulation out of adjustment.

I have a—Car, it runs perfect until I switch on the lights when it will mis-fire, back fire and stall when I put it in low gear. Everything seems to be in good order. What would you consider at fault?—G. F.

G. F.—The peculiar construction of this particular type of magneto, accentuates proper diagnosis.

There can be three reasons for his trouble. First, and play in the crank shaft. Second, shorted field coils. Third, magnets demagnetized. Each condition will give the trouble of which you speak.

You can test for and play by removing the base and prying upon crank shaft to ascertain the amount of end play which should not exist .006 of an inch.

The two remaining faults must be tested by proper test equipment. My car is a—Clutch grabs considerably. Is this doing any damage and can it be remedied?—H. M. L.

H. M. L.—This is a dangerous condition and should be remedied immediately. The flexibility of your clutch is dependent upon the series of governors located on the driven member of the clutch. It will be necessary for you to turn off the nuts on the governors, two turns to obviate this grabbing. The same applies to slipping clutch, only that the nuts are tightened instead of slackened.
