THE DREYFUS CASE.

Government Denies That it is Harming the Court Forward.

PARIS, April 22.—The Cabinet Council yesterday considered the Dreyfus affair, and it is semi-officially denied this morning that the government is spurring the Court of Cassation to give a hasty judgment. According to The Soir a private sitting of the court has decided upon the confrontations, which will probably occur next Monday.

The Figaro, continuing to-day its publication of testimony offered before the Court of Cassation in the Dreyfus revision inquiry, devotes 24 columns to some twenty depositions of minor officials, most of which are favorable to Dreyfus. It gives also a fac-simile of the bordereau. Major Forsinetti, who was director of the Cherche-Midi prison in 1894 at the time of the condemnation of Dreyfus, testified that Dreyfus consistently and persistently protested his innocence, and after he was condemned repeatedly asked for a revolver, declaring that his only crime was in having been born a Jew. The witness said that after the revision of the trial by court-martial was rejected Col. du Paty de Clam visited Dreyfus and tried his utmost to draw from him a confession that he had been entrapped in to a guilty communication of documents to a foreign power. Dreyfus energetically protested that he was not guilty, and Col. du Paty de Clam said in parting from him, "If you are really innocent, you are the greatest martyr of the century."

Major Forsinetti told the court that he had questioned Capt. Lebrun-Renaud regarding the alleged confessions of Dreyfus; but Capt. Lebrun-Renaud promptly denied that Dreyfus had confessed anything. Major Forsinetti added that, although he and Major Attelles were on terms of great friendship, the latter had never mentioned any confession to him. Forsinetti declared that he was convinced of the innocence of Dreyfus.
