At the Soviet auctions held in Leningrad July 11th, red fox sold from \$85.50 to \$220.00. White fox averaged around \$100.00. American mink \$65.00; Fitch \$15.00; blue fox \$23.00; Russian sable, highest price \$125.

The Dominion Bureau of Statistics has released its annual report on the fur industry. The value of Canada's production of raw furs for the season of 1936-1937, twelve months ending June 30th, 1937, placed at \$1,660,375. These totals comprise the value of pelts of fur bearing animals taken by trappers and pelts sold from fur farms. The value of the fur farms production is approximately 40 per cent of the whole.

The number of silver fox pelts was 204,388, an increase of 19,129 from the preceding season. The number of mink pelts showed a decrease, but the value increased by over half a million dollars. The average price for mink pelts advanced from \$11.03 to \$16.28, and the average for minkskin pelts from \$1.92 to \$1.40, while the average for silver fox pelts dropped from \$29.97 to \$28.29.

The leading provinces with regard to raw fur production are Ontario - \$87,713; Quebec - \$2,516,000; Alberta - \$2,161,000. The relation which the value of each province bears to the total of Canada is shown in these percentages: Ontario, 17.9; Quebec, 15.1; Alberta, 13.1; Manitoba, 9.8; British Columbia, 8.3; Prince Edward Island, 8.3; Saskatchewan, 8.1; North West Territories, 6.1; Nova Scotia, 5.5; New Brunswick, 5.2; Yukon, 2.2.

The total value of the fur production of Prince Edward Island for the season of 1934-1935 was \$63,293 and for the season of 1935-1936, \$2,119,708, and for 1936-1937, \$1,391,492.

Purina Fox Fash for July has as cover illustration a photo cut of Robert Carter of Milton, P. E. I., who has been feeding Chas. Holman's three-year-old males at full length. It is a beautiful three-quarter length silver fox. Mr. Carter evidently knows how to raise good ones. On page two is a cut of C. Z. Holman from a photo taken May 20th, 1937. He is a real fox breeder and operates a ranch at Moosejaw, Alberta, and has received excellent returns for his pelts. He is a brother of Charles B. Roy Holman of Charlottetown.

On page 6 of Fox-Fax is a reproduction of a photograph taken during the Provincial Fox Show last fall, in which H. J. Kennedy, Provincial representative, B. Howatt, and C. Z. Holman, and an employee figure, holding five beautiful foxes owned by Mr. Howatt. It is difficult to get a good photograph of a fox in the open but this is a real good one.

Mr. W. E. Russel, well known authority on silver fox farming, addressing Ontario foxmen at their annual field day, said that many ranchers do not know what a really true colored fox looks like, because they never attend to the foxes or even visit neighboring ranches. He said that a really true fox should be a dark grey mouse color and should be voluminous and strong enough to hold up the guard fur. Black should be black and silver a shiny metallic silver with plenty of lustre. In handling pelts the fur should have enough elasticity to stretch the guard fur from the hind quarters to the shoulders it will spring back into place again.

The pelt should not have too fine a texture because the trend of the market is for a strong fur that stands up and wears well. Good size the breeders give good size in their pups. Feed a ration in which there is plenty of meat. Things should be quite abrupt. Only pups which have been mated should be kept as breeders. Do not use animals for breeding that have not shown the best of age animals are not fed a good balanced ration the bar tends to become shorter. In some cases the shortening of the bar may be due to internal parasites.

H. C. Rutiven said that he considered his floor was superior to board floors for pelts, because the belly fur does not become discolored from excreta. Second, the foxes on such floors must exercise and seem quieter and come up to feed more quickly. He puts his foxes on wire when they are on the floor. A good amount of marsh hay is supplied and this is changed every two weeks.

J. J. McCague, leading Ontario breeder, said he had a better growth of fur, better color, greater volume and strength of his foxes on wire than those on boards. In fact he found that out of all the yearling females he had chosen for showing only those on the bottom pens were of high enough quality. Those on board floors do not measure up to those on wire floors.

Samuel Johnston of Fortune, a Director of the Silver Fox Breeders and Exhibitors Association, was in town yesterday attending a meeting of the Directors. He reports all well with his large crop of pups. He has been a heavy feeder of fish with good results, but like the writer is now wondering whether to cut down or cut out that item from the diet.
