

German Runner Wins Marathon

Paul Debruyne 24 Year Old Plodder Came Within Ace Of Breaking Johnny Miles' Record Established In 1929 — Demar Finished 18th.

(Canadian Press) BOSTON, April 19.—The machine-like strides of Paul Debruyne 24 year old German marathon champion, were out 220 rivals today as they carried him home first in the 36th running of the Hopkinton-Boston marathon, 210 yards ahead of Jimmy Henigan of Medford, last year's winner.

The smooth-running Teuton raced almost shoulder to shoulder with Henigan during five of the last miles before uncorking a terrific driving spurt that forced that 40 year old veteran to wilt badly when the finish line was almost in sight. Debruyne appeared capable of breaking the record for this classic. He finished strong in two hours, thirty-three minutes and 2.5 seconds, less than a half-minute slower than the mark established by Johnny Miles, Canadian ace, back in 1929.

Willie Kyronen of the Finnish-American A. C., New York, who ran third, past five of the seven checking stations, finished in that position, 23 seconds later than Henigan, whose time was 2:34:32, the best he has ever made in almost a dozen years in this race. Kyronen was second in 1930 and third the year before.

Albert "Whitey" Michelson of the Milwaukee A. A., New York, another veteran plodder, ran a steady race and finished fourth in 2:38:23 2-5. William Steiner, New York National guardsman, placed fifth in 2:38:48. Alex Burnside of Toronto, was sixth in 2:39:42, Earle Collins of Medford, seventh in 2:40:59, Leslie Pawson, Pawtucket, R. I., eighth in 2:41:36, Sydney Cudworth, Toronto, ninth in 2:42:22 and John Semple of Lynn, placed the last place in the "first run" by finishing in 2:43:07.

Three other former winners also started. Age, however, exacted its usual toll. Clarence Demar, the 44 year old Keene, N. H., teacher, who won seven Boston marathons, was one of them in the past 10 years. He recovered that his usual pace was much too slow for his younger rival. He started off in 18th place and finished there.

Henigan twice has represented the United States in the Olympics. He was a member of the cross country team in 1924 and a marathon runner in 1928. He has more than 700 trophies and has been a specialist in ten mile road races.

(Canadian Press) FREDERICTON, N. B., April 19.—The re-alignment of hockey clubs in the Maritime Provinces will depend largely upon the outcome of the meeting of the senior group, Northern Section, M. A. H. A., to be held not later than a fortnight from today at the call of President F. T. Pridham, Fredericton. The date will depend quite largely upon the condition of the highways for motor travel.

The probability is believed by many hockey fans to be the breaking up of the group, with Moncton and Charlottetown joining with Halifax in a new organization and the remainder of the New Brunswick clubs forming a New Brunswick organization of some kind.

Dalhousie Rangers are reported to be divided in opinion, some wanting to risk the added expense of the Maritime organization, and others favoring consolidation of the circuit to include New Brunswick clubs.

The first move of the committee was to suspend the industrial commission, the technical commission and the identity card bureau. The committee was chosen yesterday with Ald. J. M. Gahbas as chairman. It succeeded that of Tancredi Fortin, chairman of the executive committee under Mayor Camille Houde's regime. Mr. Houde was defeated at the polls on April fourth by Fernand Rivest, former Secretary of State.
