

# MUNIFICENT GIFT OF HON. CHARLES DALTON TO P. E. ISLAND

## THE JAPANESE TREATY BILL

Amendment to Bill is Beaten by 76 to 36—Sub-section Moved.

(Special to the Guardian) OTTAWA, April 4.—The bill proclaiming Canada's assent to the trade and navigation treaty between Great Britain and Japan was read a third time and passed without division by the commons tonight. After the amendments proposed by opposition members had been voted down. The Liberals still showed a disposition to retract the debate in spite of the assurance of their leader, Sir Wilfrid Laurier at the outset that he approved of the measure and would not oppose it.

Hon. Frank Oliver and Hon. Wm. Pugsley both differed from Sir Wilfrid. The former wished to amend the bill by adding to the sub clause providing that the treaty should not overrule the terms of the immigration act of 1910. He proposed to enact that the treaty should not affect existing legislation upon the subject of the immigration of legislation "to be adopted in the future. His proposal was voted down and Mr. Pugsley came forward with a suggestion that the sub clause should except regulations passed under the immigration act in the past or future from the operation of the treaty.

## NAVAL DEMONSTRATION OFF MONTENEGROIN COAST

LONDON, April 2.—Sir Edward Grey the British foreign secretary, informed the House of Commons today that as Montenegro had resumed the attack on Scutari, contrary to the will of the European powers, the latter had decided to proceed with the naval demonstration off the Montenegrin coast.

### SHAKE
