Economists in Conference

OTTAWA, Jan. 4—(OP)—More than 30 economists representing 17 Canadian universities completed a two-day conference with government officials on co-ordination and integration of economic policy late Saturday, the War-time Prices and Trade Board said tonight. Following the conference Donald Gordon, prices and trade board chairman, invited the delegates to "give us the benefit of your thinking" after information obtained at the discussions had been considered.
