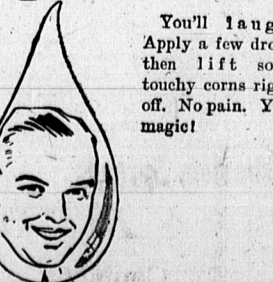

Canadian "Ace" Visits Prince Edward Island

One of Canada's "Aces" in the Royal Air Force, is on the Island. He is Captain G. A. Thompson, and is with his father, Mr. J. A. Thompson, the well known Montreal commercial man.

Captain Thompson had been eight months in France, after spending considerable time in England, and returned to Canada about five weeks ago. While in France he was scouting, bombarding the enemy lines, etc., and at the end of the war, after 390 hours of fighting in the air, he succeeded in bringing down 18 enemy machines, and captured a German tank with prisoners. Capt. Thompson's decorations include the Croix de Guerre with three bars. A brother, Harry, of the 14th Highlanders, Montreal, was killed in Arras on March 21st, 1918, while another brother, George, returned from the front.

The many friends of Mr. Thompson are giving his distinguished son, who makes his first trip to the province, a hearty welcome.
