**Quiet Half Hour**

Miss Mary Thompson, formerly of Oxford, N. S., now of the Friendship House, London, Ontario, addressed the congregation and spoke from the text "That I should know Him."

The different experiences of various missionaries in their work was described by her. David Livingstone, when he went to preach his first sermon, how he stumbled so badly that he was afraid he would not be accepted and how he overcame his trouble through faith in Christ so that he went out to Kogawin and taught among the robbers was cited as an instance of faith in the power of God.

The case of Sundar, a High Caste Hindu, who became a teacher of Christ was another beautiful illustration of faith and prayer. Throughout her address Miss Thomson held that much can be accomplished by prayer, and faith in our Saviour to help us at all times.

Miss Elma Inman of Bedeque closed this part of the service with prayer, Hymn, "Breathe on me Breath of Life," and prayer by Mrs. R. A. Jamieson closed the morning session.

**Memorials**

1. From the Maritime Conference Branch executive. Whereas the forwarding of thank offering envelopes for auxiliaries, young people and mission bands to presbyterial by branch officers is a double expense the Maritime Conference Branch executive would recommend to the Dominion Board that they be sent direct from Toronto to Presbyterial officers.  
 2. Memorials from Cumberland, Halifax, Moncton and Pictou, ask that proper report forms be issued for the auxiliary Supply Secretaries for the Maritimes.  
 3. From Halifax, resolved that the two delegates from the Maritime branch to the meetings of the Dominion consist of one branch officer, and either an officer or lay-member of a presbyterial taking the presbyterial in order so that our territory shall be represented fairly.

 5. From St. Stephen. Whereas it has come to our notice that the closing of the United Church Mission at Sydney is under consideration by the Dominion Board, and whereas the work of this mission reaches an area untouched by any other Protestant organizations and embraces a tremendous area, therefore be it resolved to memorialize the Dominion Board through the Maritime Advisory Committee that it is against the best interests of the work of the United Church and the Kingdom of God to close this mission or curtail the work and that in the event of the
