

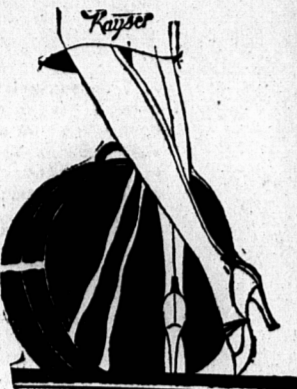

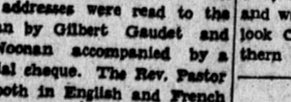

Important Change Made In Rhodes Scholarships

MONTREAL, Oct. 12.—An important change was made in the administration of the Rhodes Scholarships this year. The trustees, acting under the power given them by the Rhodes Trust Act, 1920, announced that in future scholars will be allowed to spend the third year of their scholarship at any university of Great Britain and, in special cases, at any university on the continent of Europe, the overseas Dominions of the United States, other than the "country of origin" on conditions approved by the authorities concerned. This change is of great importance to scholars who take up research work as it means that if special circumstances make it advisable they may supplement the work done in Oxford by spending a year at another university. If this becomes necessary, it would also enlarge their knowledge and experience of university life and methods.
