the farmers to this effect and on Nov. 9 the farmers, over 100 in all, came in with their hogs. Mr. Larkin was there with a reputable man Mr. McGrath to assist in weighing and the company scales were there. He bought the hogs, took every precaution to bring them to the conditions of the Packing Co. He had to buy the hogs or send the farmers about their business. He bought the hogs, made out the weight of each and gave the cheques at once. This he did till twelve or one o'clock. He wired about ten o'clock to the D. P. Co. that he was buying hogs and asked if he would buy cattle or sheep and send next day. At 12:45 he got a message "Do not want hogs from you today. If you send them you do so on your own responsibility." Mr. Larkin immediately stopped selling and had to send numbers of farmers home. There were between 100 and 200 hogs there bought and paid for. Some were between 4 and 5 o'clock a man named Beardson came to Larkin and wanted to have the hogs weighed over again. Mr. Larkin refused. The hogs were loaded on the cars and the next day they were at the factory. Mr. Larkin also went in and went down to the factory after dinner. Some words took place. Mr. Wiley said he had told Mr. Larkin to be at the weighing but Mr. Nelson, bookkeeper for the Dominion Packing Co., contradicted this by saying the hogs were all weighed before Mr. Larkin came to the factory at all. Beardson, the weigher for the company, says he did not tell Mr. Wiley that Larkin did not pay for the hogs but on the stand Mr. Wiley swore Mr. Larkin did not pay for all the hogs as Beardson had told him that. In the case there is a question of contradiction between Mr. Larkin, an admittedly reputable man and Mr. Wiley who, to say the least, was very reckless in his statements, giving what he had heard as facts and afterwards it turns out he did not even hear what he says he did. A question of fact was a matter for adjudication by the jury and for the jury alone. If this verdict is set aside trial by jury becomes a mockery and a snare. The present court has not seen the demeanor of the witnesses and could not come to a correct conclusion. The question of the credibility of the witness is a matter altogether for the jury to judge. Why should Mr. Larkin not get his money? He has notified the farmers for ten miles around, has weighed out the hogs and paid nearly \$2000 a day all he gets is a mere bag of \$18 while it is attempted to deprive him of \$72 more. What law is this verdict against? Is there a law that one witness is to be believed and another disbelieved? Is it a question of contract? Everything is clear that the contract was existing and was as binding by the conduct of the parties as it could be. It was admitted that Larkin has full authority to pay the farmers and also that the weighing was to be done at Tignish as the Company had been told that the farmers would not agree to weigh in Charlottetown. Mr. Wiley says Mr. Larkin wanted to do the weighing but there is every reason in the world why Mr. Wiley should want Mr. Larkin to do the weighing but none why Mr. Larkin himself should want to do the weighing.

SUPREME COURT.

Larkin vs Dominion Packing Co. Ltd. In this case the jury had given Mr. Larkin a verdict for \$72.51. The verdict was asked to be set aside as:

- (1) contrary to evidence.
- (2) contrary to law.
- (3) Contrary to the weight of evidence.

Mr. Stewart, K. C., referred to the purposes for which the Dominion Packing Company was incorporated and the kind of business they carried on. A. F. stated the objects of the Dominion Packing Company. A. F. Larkin lives outside of Tignish and had been doing business for the Dominion Packing Co. in 1902 and 1903. Previous to this transaction in question on Nov. 9, 1903 he had an arrangement by which he notified the farmers to send in hogs on certain days. When the hogs came in he did part of the weighing and was their broker at their own request. They were paying him 10c per hog for these transactions. The jury had to do with what took place Nov. 9, 1903 and what led up to that occasion. Mr. Larkin had met Mr. Wiley in the city previous to this date and asked him to do the weighing which up till then had been done by a man sent from the city. Mr. Larkin demurred and the matter was left in that state. Mr. Larkin leaving with the idea that Mr. Wiley wanted him to weigh the hogs. On Oct. 31, Mr. Larkin got a letter from Mr. Wiley asking him to take hogs on the morning of Nov. 9, and stating the price would be one quarter cent lower than the last furnished price list. Mr. Larkin notified
