THE BIBLE SOCIETY.

A large number of our readers are deeply interested in the work of the British and Foreign Bible Society, which was organized 101 years ago, and of the Canadian Bible Society organized in Toronto in April last, the claims of which were ably presented by Rev. G. M. Campbell at the meeting in Zion Church last evening. Great indeed has been the work of the venerable parent Society. It has circulated 192,337,740 copies of the Holy Scriptures, in 430 different languages and tongues. During the past year 12 additional languages appear in the list, six of which belong to Africa, three to Oceania, two to Asia and one to Central America. Several hundreds of translators, revisors and assistants are now engaged in promoting translations and revisions in over 100 languages.

The work steadily increases. Last year 5,857,645 copies of the Book were distributed, being 100,284 more than in the previous year. The Society supplies the various foreign missions with the vast bulk of copies which they need in the various languages and thus greatly facilitates their work. No application for a grant of Scriptures is ever denied and every request to print the Book in a new tongue has been granted. In addition to the great work thus above outlined the Society employs 930 colporteurs, and 800 Bible women engaged in the work of distribution in connection with 40 different missionary organizations. In many cases the distribution is made at greatly reduced rates and far below cost. It will thus be seen that the work of the Bible Society is as vast as it is beneficent. Its field is the world.

Russian 4 per cent securities have fallen to 71, which is considerably below the lowest point touched by them during the disasters of the war with Japan. In the present condition of the Czar's distracted empire no one cares to buy Russian bonds at any price.

The promised freedom of the press in Russia, and which by virtue of the Czar's promise had already been largely exercised, has been snatched away. The law as now promulgated re-asserts the arbitrary restrictions and punishments heretofore in vogue and provides machinery for the suppression rather than the encouragement of free discussion. Apparently the reactionists are now in control of the Government in distracted Russia. Premier Witte may well desire to resign and so rid himself of the responsibility for repressive measures which must be contrary to his judgment.

At a meeting of the St. John School Board the other day a large number of teachers were granted the usual increase of \$25 a year. In addition the time of the Board was very largely taken up with applications for further and larger increases.

If Mr. Doull will give due credit in the proper quarter for the theory he propounds and the diagrams by which he has illustrated it (which he really ought to do) we shall be prepared to give him due credit for the little that remains of any value in his more voluminous than luminous lucubrations. We cannot give him credit for the humor of the situation he has created as he seems so unconscious of it. But it is really funny.

Mr. Chamberlain in a speech at Oxford the other day declared that the country had now passed into the hands of "the Home rulers and Little Englanders." Mr. Redmond feels confident that Home Rule must now come, but the London Spectator thinks an understanding has been arrived at by which the Irish question will be kept in the background as far as possible during the elections. Home Rule is not popular in England or Scotland. The new Cabinet will naturally desire to fight the battle on their strongest ground, the trade question, but Irish affairs will evidently be forced into prominence, if only by the Unionist Opposition and the Irish Nationalists.

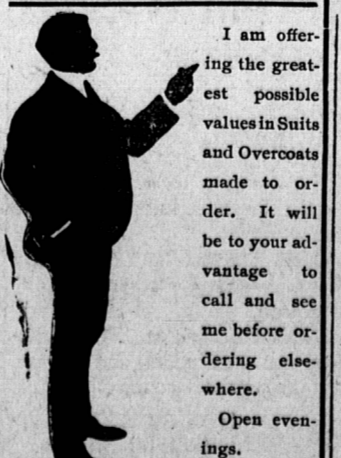

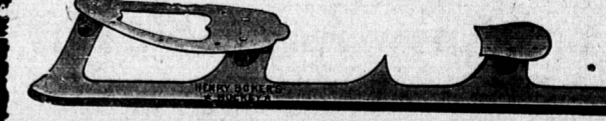
