ROBERTS—Suddenly at Kinkora, P. E. I., on January 2, 1947, Elizabeth Roberts, aged 76 years.

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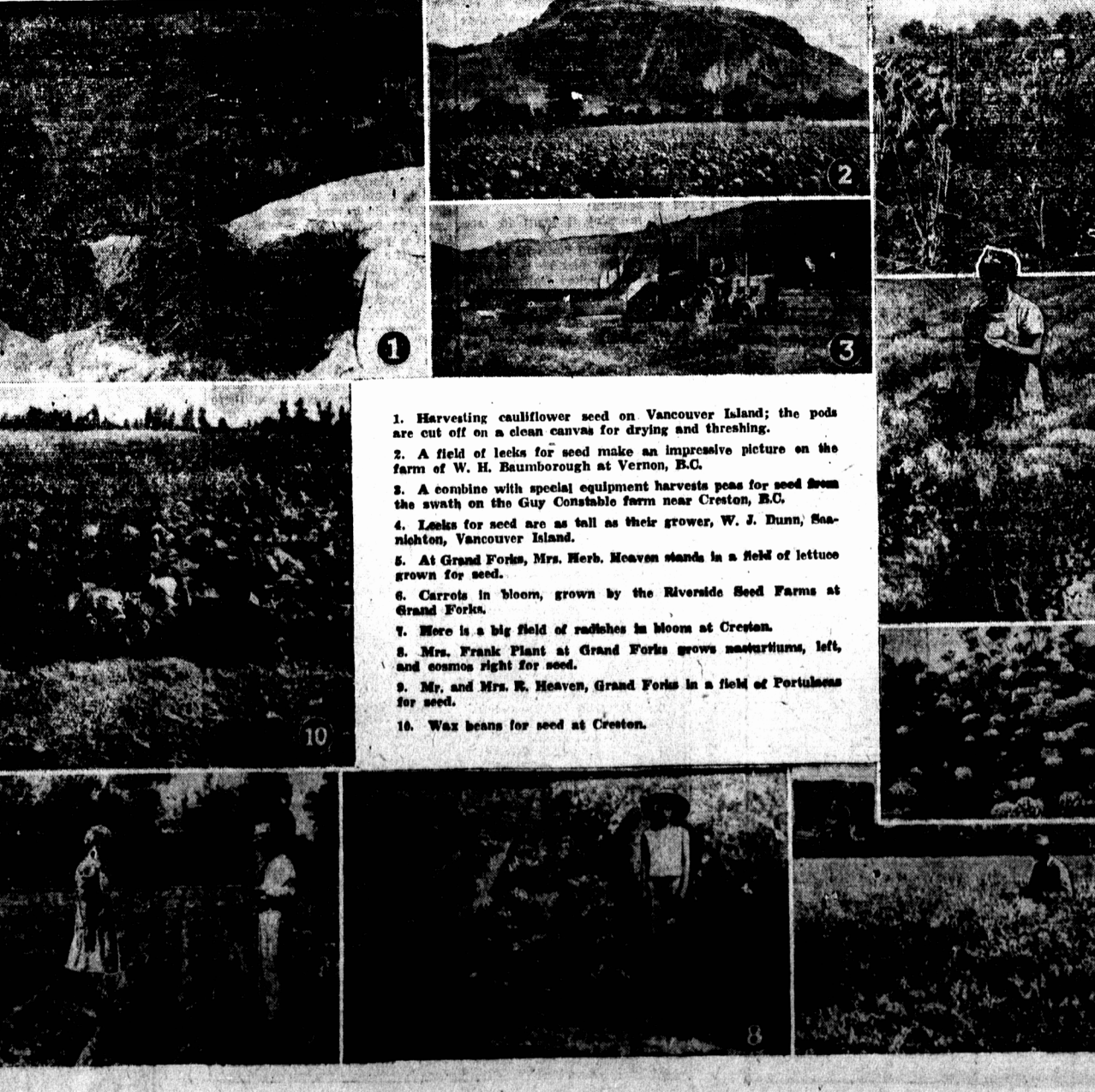
