Horse Races Thursday, Aug. 27th 1914

The management intend holding their annual horse race meeting on above date.

There will be the following classes: 2.10 Class Trot and Pace, mile heats, purse \$200.00; 2.24 Class Trot and Pace mile heats, purse, \$100.00; 3 minute Class Trot and Pace mile heats, purse, \$100.00.

Entrance fee, 5 per cent. with entry, and 5 per cent. from winners, entries close August 20th. Five or more horses to enter and three or more to start in each class. Best three in five. All races to end at end of fifth heat.

Two or more horses by the same owner or trained in the same stable may start in any race. Any horse distancing the field entitled to first money only.

The management reserve the right to change programme, postpone, or declare off, any race, for any good cause. The rules of the National Trotting Association to govern except where they conflict with above conditions.

Arrangements will be made to have special trains from Vernon, Charlottetown and Summerside and reduced rates on other lines, particulars of which will be printed later.

A NARROW ESCAPE.—Messrs. Joseph Read & Co., Summerside, have been advised that the bark Al-lanwild owned by R. H. & Co., St. John, which left New York on July 26th, with a cargo of hard coal for Read & Co., Summerside, had a narrow escape from capture by a German cruiser off the coast of Nova Scotia. She however eluded them and put into La Have, she is now working up along the coast and is expected to arrive in Summerside in a few days. This will likely be the last cargo of hard coal to arrive here as it is not now possible to secure a schooner.

VOLUNTEERS OFF.—The two sections of the Ninth Ambulance Corps which have been ordered to do duty at Valcartier Camp, Que., as a stationary field hospital, left for their destination on Saturday morning, travelling to Summerside by special train. There were about sixty officers and men, who marched to the station headed by the Abegweit L. I. Band. A large crowd of persons assembled to witness their departure and give them God-speed, and there was a good deal of cheering, as the train with the boys on board steamed out of the station. This morning another detachment of soldier lads will leave Charlottetown—the first body of the volunteers for overseas service to leave the Island. They

comprize six members of the Signalling Corps, viz., Sgt. E. Weeks, Corpl. George Gardiner, Pts. H. R. Stewart, V. McLeod, H. Large and H. Wedlock. They will proceed from here to St. John, where they will join No. 6 Signalling Company, and will proceed to Valcartier Camp where the assembling of the contingent at that place begins.

—WEDDING BELLS.—The marriage took place in Summerside on August 14th, of Miss Rubie L. Sanderson, only daughter of the late Margaret F. and Capt. R. A. Sanderson, to Mr. G. H. Campbell, Principal of the Summerside High School and eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. R. H. Campbell, of this city. Owing to Capt. Campbell's being about to leave with the overseas Volunteers Contingent, the marriage took place very quietly in the Christian Parsonage, Rev. C. E. Armstrong officiating.

The Dominions Royal Trade Commission arrived on the Island on Saturday night by the steamer Empress, coming from St. John, N. B. They were received at the wharf by the Premier, Hon. J. A. Matheson, representing the Government of the Island, and by His Honor Judge Stewart, representing the Charlottetown Board of Trade, of which he is President. The party came on to Charlottetown on a special train, travelling in the Superintendent's coach which was specially placed at their disposal.

The Commissioners commence their labors in Charlottetown this morning at ten o'clock, holding their sessions in the Legislative Assembly Chamber.

The visitors will be entertained at a luncheon which is to be held in the Prince of Wales College Hall.

A party of the Royal Trade Commissioners was entertained yesterday afternoon on a special train, travelling in the D. G. S. Brant under command of Captain Walker. The party included Sir Rider Haggard, Mr. and Mrs. Garnett, Mr. and Mrs. Tadlow, Mr. and Mrs. Lorimer, Mr. Campbell, Mr. Sinclair and Mr. Glessent, Hon. Premier Matheson and Mrs. Matheson, Hon. Murdoch McKinnon, Judge Stewart, Major and Miss Bartlett, Mr. and Mrs. Frank R. Hertz, Mr. A. A. McLean, M. P., Judge and Mrs. Shaw, of B. C., Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Aitkin, Dr. James Kier, Malpeque, Mr. F. W. Hyndman, Judge and Miss Poullot and a number of others. After a delightful sail to West River Bridge, on return tea was served and the city reached at 6.30. The visitors expressed themselves delighted with the scenery comparing it with what they had seen in Devonshire. Nowhere in their journeyings throughout the dominions had they come across scenery which compared so favorably with the garden country of England. It may be mentioned that Sir Rider Haggard is the well-known novelist and also the pioneer in the "back to the land" propaganda in England. Mr. Garnett comes from Clitheroe, Lancashire, and is a leading spinner. Mr. Tadlow is from Dublin, and is director in several railway companies as well as a member of the Railway Directors Association in London. Mr. Lorimer comes from Glasgow and is chairman of the Scottish Steel Association and of the North British Locomotive Works, as well as a director of the Glasgow and South Western Railway Company. Mr. Sinclair, the New Zealand member, is a well-known lawyer and newspaper writer and an authority on Commercial Matters. Mr. Campbell is a member of the South Australian Legislature, an ex-newspaper proprietor and a celebrated commercial lawyer. All expressed themselves highly satisfied with the information they have collected so far concerning Canada and regret that the war necessitates the suspension of their sittings after leaving the Island. It is understood that after proceeding to Montreal they will return to England where they will engage in the preparation of their report.
