"SPOTTERS" AT MONCTON.—The "spotters," or so-called efficiency men, have again made their appearance on this section of the C.N.R. Atlantic Region, according to reports gleaned from railway men. The "spotters" were withdrawn from these parts four or five days prior to the recent bye-election in Kent County. That election, however, is now a thing of the past and it is stated the "spotters" are again doing duty on this section of the Atlantic Region.—Moncton Times.

SCHOONER REFLOATED.—The tern schooner E. C. Adams, of Lunenburg, which was ashore at River John, arrived in port Friday in tow of the steamer Curlew and anchored in the stream, the Curlew curlew at Hendry's wharf. About the first of October, the schooner E. C. Adams, Captain Corkum, was en route from Halifax to a New Brunswick port in the Miramichi to load lumber for American ports, when she was driven high and dry 150 yards up from the shore at River John. Efforts were made to release her, the Government steamer Brant from Charlottetown making a number of unsuccessful attempts and had to give up. At last men from Lunenburg were sent to River John by her owners, and made a cradle under her, and this time were rewarded by the schooner returning to the water after two months of hard work. Friday, in tow of the steamer Curlew, the E. C. Adams arrived from River John via Port Mulgrave and anchored in the stream. Saturday the Curlew continued her tow to Lunenburg where the E. C. Adams will be repaired, and will likely lay up for the winter.—Halifax Chronicle.

ADDRESSES PUPILS.—The first of a series of addresses before the senior pupils of Queen Square school was delivered on Friday afternoon by Hon. J. J. Hughes. Hon. Mr. Hughes' address was replete with sound practical advice and he showed by reviewing briefly the lives of some self-made men, how success might be achieved in life.
