Referring to the death of the late Capt. Thomas Allen, for many years engaged in the winter mail service between Cape Tormentine, on the New Brunswick side, and the Amherst News says: The older inhabitants yet recall the incident that occurred six to five years ago on the 25th of last February, when Mr. Allen and his associates spent forty-eight hours on the ice field making a distance of nine or ten miles. All hope of the party had been given up, but the almost superhuman efforts of Mr. Allen, a landing was at last effected. During the last twelve years he had resided in Amherst with his daughter Mrs. W. G. Bener, at the Cumberland House, and many an evening he would entertain the guests of that house with stirring tales of the reminiscences of his active life. Two sons went to sea a number of years ago and have never since been heard from. Three other children died prior to the death of their father.

Mrs. Townsend, wife of Rev. H. D. Townsend, Methodist minister at Newport, N. S., and well known here, died in the provincial sanatorium, Kentville, on Wednesday. Her husband and sister, Mrs. Edwards, of Toronto, were with her at the time of her death. Mrs. Townsend was a native of Warwick, Bermuda, and was married to Mr. Townsend when he was pastor of the church in Sandy and Southampton on the Boylston and Baddeck circuits she was a faithful laborer in the cause of the poor and very greatly beloved. During the last two years she has been a great sufferer. During the winter she was taken to Bermuda to see if the air of her native land would be beneficial. Turk's Island was also visited, but all she was brought to Kentville, but she steadily failed until the end came. Mr. Townsend will have the sympathy of many who have known him on his different fields of labor which included Prince Edward Island.
