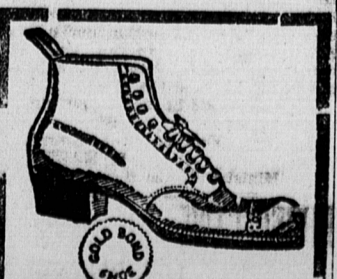

correct. Why should the farmer be taxed for bad roads for the transporting of his produce to market, when here is a source of market which would pay interest on the whole sum needed to macadamize all the roads to our main shipping ports?

I have no wish to say or do anything to injure the oyster men. On the contrary, I believe if the Government lease the live beds to a company with means to properly cultivate them they would give employment to the men, not only during the short season of oyster taking (a few weeks) but during the whole season in replanting and caring for the beds.

In conclusion, I wish to impress on the minds of all who read this article to give the matter careful consideration, with a view to future action.

STATELY FUNERAL OF POPE PIUS X

ROME, Aug. 22.—Borne by red uniformed members of the Scialoi who, when he was alive, carried him in the sedan gestoria chair, the body of Pope Pius X, dressed in pontifical robes and mitre and with the other emblems of his sacred office lying beside it, was taken to the chapel of the Blessed Sacrament in St. Peter's, where the solemn rites of absolution were performed.

Thousands of persons previously had visited the throne room, where the body lay, to look upon the face of the dead pontiff and many of them wore themselves into the great processions from the throne room to the chapel. The procession was headed by the bearers of the massive silver pontifical cross and twenty cardinals, archbishops, bishops, priests and papal and court chamberlain and members of the Swiss noble and Palatine guards in their multi-colored uniforms. The scene was an impressive one. Under the flare of the candles in the chapels could be seen the tear-dimmed eyes of prelate, priest, layman, and papal guard. Especially affected were the bearers of the body of the Pope.

The burial of Pope Pius will be absolutely private. This was decided upon to-day.

The body was embalmed to-day, prior to its removal to the chapel for the ceremony of absolution. Instead of the antiquated method of removing the viscera and preserving it in a vase in the church of St. Vincent near the quirinal, a fluid which it is claimed will preserve the body perfectly was injected into the arteries.

The late Pope's only brother, Angelo Sarto, arrived in Rome to-day. From a handsome, elderly person, old man. Great affection existed between the two brothers, and when Angelo entered the mortuary chamber to-day, the dead pontiff did not answer his customary greeting, he fell to his knees at the side of the body, sobbing aloud. There he knelt for an hour, praying, the tears meanwhile streaming down his face, and sobbing convulsively his frame. Kindly hands eventually lifted the sorrowful old man, and led him from the death chamber to the apartment of his sisters.

Mourning throughout Rome continued to-day. All the theatres, moving picture shows, and other places of amusement remained closed. Thousands of persons gathered in St. Peter's square last night, and remained there, some of them in prayer, until broad daylight, when a violent thunder storm, accompanied by sharp flashes of lightning, drove them away. The contents of the will of Pope Pius became known to-day. The testament was dated 1911, but has been made in successive years. To the members of his immediate family he leaves \$20,000, which was presented to him some years ago, and \$2,400 to his nephews. Both bequests are made subject to the approval of his successor. In the will is the following phrase: "I was born poor, and lived poor, and I wish to die poor."
