Scoring Spree; Rangers Rout Canadiens 9-0

NEW YORK, Feb. 4 (CP)—The league-leading Rangers went on the wildest scoring rampage of the National Hockey League season tonight, routing the last-place Montreal Canadiens 9-0 in an on-ice game as has been seen in New York for several seasons.

The Rangers, pouring through an almost non-existent Canadian defence at will, subjected Wilf Cude in the Canadiens nets to a terrific barrage almost from the opening whistle. They got two goals in the first period, three in the second and four in the third.

Only goalie Dave Kerr, and right wing Mac Colville failed to share in the 23 scoring points picked up by the Rangers. Phil Watson and Dutch Hiller were the biggest scorers, the former with a goal and three assists and Hiller with two goals and two assists. With Bryan Hextall and Kirby MacDon-ald two goals and an assist each.

The other Rangers marksmen were Nell Colville and Lynn Patrick. Kerr's shutout was his sixth of the season, two more than any other goalie.

It was a disastrous return to major-league hockey for Cude, who has spent a year in the International-American League before being called back to replace Claude Bourque. But, though a couple of the goals might have been termed soft, the route was not Cude's fault. His defence simply went to pieces.

Time and again Cude was left helpless as his defencemen backed in and let Ranger sharpshooters through to stand unguarded at his door step. Or else the Canadiens wingmen failed to keep tabs of their checks, who would come scooting in from the sides to pick up perfectly placed passes to the crease.

Kerr was able to look on at the debacle at the other end most of the time for the Canadiens, besides their defence never got a decent offensive under way even when they twice held an edge in manpower through penalties.

Ontario Man Places In Famed Millrose 600

NEW YORK, Feb. 4 (CP)—Young Bill Fritz of Kingston, Ont., unknown to the United States indoor track circuit until last season, forced Jim Herbert of New York University to the second-fastest 600 in the 33-year history of the Millrose Athletic Games before 15,000 fans Saturday night.

Carrying the tri-colored jersey of Queen's University, the Canadian Olympian placed second for the second successive year in the famed Millrose 600, but he gained a measure of revenge in running ahead of Wesley Wallace of Fordham, the man who beat him last year and in Boston last week.

Herbert, a long-striding negro, finished in 1:11.4, with Fritz a couple of yards back, and Sanford Johnson of New York City. This was one of the feature races of the night, along with the Wanamaker Mile in which Chuck Fenske, tackling a blazing last quarter on to the sizzling early pace set by Blaine Ridsdahl, finished in four minutes, 14.4 seconds, a meet record.

The only other Canadian entered, Larry O'Connor of the University of Toronto, failed to qualify for the final of the 60-yard high hurdles. He ran an easy second to Ed Dugger of Tufts College, New England champion, in their heat but after a third place finish in the semi-final.

The field was a yard ahead of O'Connor at the first hurdle, but he was one inch behind the first two when they broke the tape. The final was won by Allan Tomich of Detroit, in rec'd-equaling time of 13 seconds, with Shields and Dugger second and third.

Three Amateurs Refuse To Join Canadiens

MONTREAL, Feb. 4 (CP)—Manager Jules Dugal of Montreal Canadiens announced today that the amateur line of the Lemay brothers and Gordie Poirier had declined to sign contracts, with his National Hockey League club.

Dugal said all three members of St. Hyacinthe's high-scoring line in the Quebec Provincial semi or hockey league had agreed to terms but objected to the clause in the contracts. The clauses could not be changed, he said.

Montague, Charlottetown & Summerside Meet For Curling Title Wednesday

Opposing skips are F. R. McLaine, heading the Big Four, defending champions, C. K. Wightman leading the Montague rink and W. A. Currie skipping the Summerside challengers.

This year's bonspiel, the annual high spot of the Curling season appears to be a wide open battle all the way with reputedly stronger rinks coming from Summerside than in past years. Each rink has gone through tough schedules in the past four weeks and consensus of opinion is that all three contenders will be at the top of their form when Wednesday rolls around.

Big Four has only one change from last year, E. R. Bell being the newcomer. Bell plays second stone with J. A. Frazer, lead, G. G. Hughes, Mate and F. R. McLaine Skip. For the latter two players it will mark the third entry into the provincial championship with Fraser having been on one previous Island title rink.

C. K. Wightman will have M. C. Reynolds as mate, George Gordon as second stone and Carl Boehner first stone.

W. A. Currie will have Dr. H. E. Clark as mate, Theron Morrison as second stone and Edwin Estey in first stone position.

Providing the roads are favorable for motor traffic it is expected the matches will start at 10 o'clock in the morning, other wise if the rinks have to come by rail the starting time will have to be changed to suit the arrival of the incoming trains.

Bruins Run Riot To Trim Amerks 7-1

BOSTON, Feb. 4 (CP)—Firing in three goals in each of the last two periods, the champion Boston Bruins laced New York Amerks 7-1 tonight in a National Hockey League game.

The Amerks were minus Eddie Shore since their first setback since they traded Eddie Wiseman to Boston for Shore three games ago. Because the latter had notified his admirers in advance that he would not appear here, the crowd totalled about 8,500, one of the smallest of the Boston season.

After being held to a single tally during the first period, the Bruins set off three-goal bursts in each of the remaining frames and held their rivals scoreless until one minute of the finale.

At that point Lorne Carr ruined the Bruins' inspiration by scoring a second consecutive shutout with a 10-foot scoring shot that polished off a combination play with Art Chapman and Harvey Jackson.

Herb Cain opened the Bruins' scoring about halfway through the opener but the Amerks managed to hold them in check for another 10 minutes, until Buzz Bost suffered the only penalty of the game.

While he was off, Bobby Bauer countered. During the remaining action, Bill Cowey broke goal, Earl Robertson twice and Mel Hill, Woody Dumart and Flash Hollett contributed to the Bruins' top-heavy scoring total.

Although held scoreless, Milt Schmidt increased his league-leading total by collecting a pair of assists.

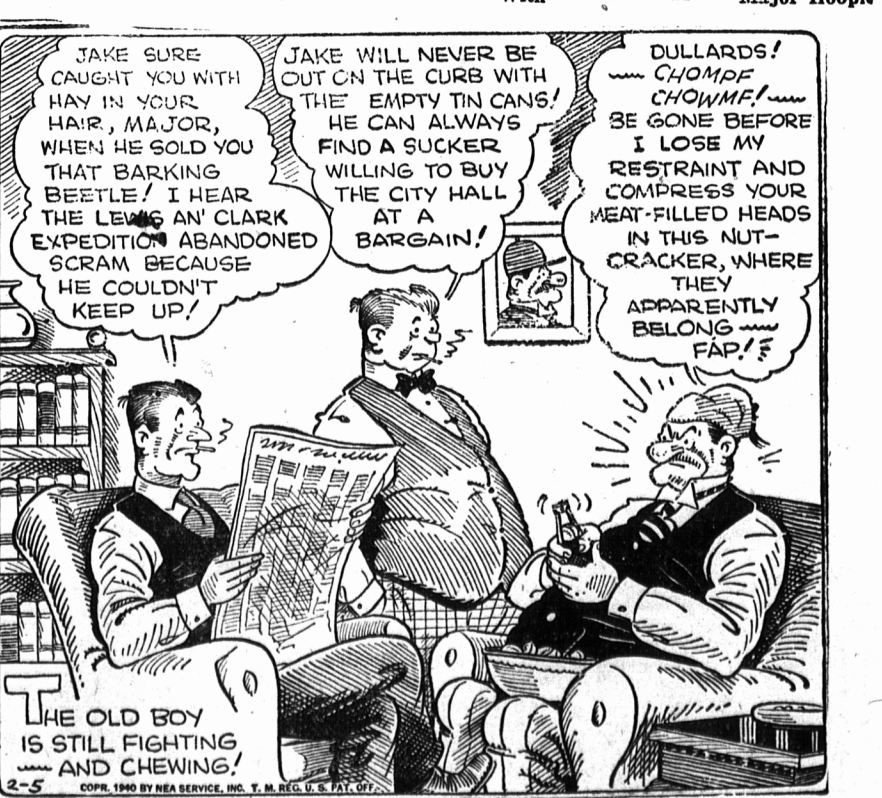
Preisinger, trailing Lamb by 20 points, won a brilliant victory in the three-quarter mile event while the Milwaukee youth was eliminated in the semi-final.
