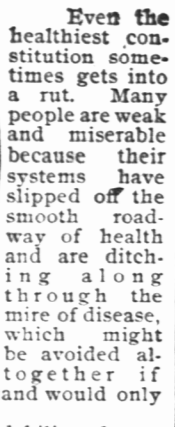


PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND

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Sale of False Tresses.

It is estimated that over 12,000,000 pounds of human hair are used annually in the civilized world for adorning the heads of women. In New York City alone over four tons of this class of goods are imported yearly. "Not a little of the hair used in this country," said a New York dealer, "comes from the heads of American women, and is fully as fine in shade and texture as the imported article. We had a big harvest during the craze that women had not long ago for having their hair cut short. Many thousands of women who then had their locks sheared have since bitterly regretted it, as in many instances their hair has grown so slowly that they have been compelled to wear a wig or a switch since the fashion changed. After the majority of women reach the age of 30, the hair seems partially to lose its vigor, and, if cut, will not grow long again. Two-thirds of the women now-days use false hair more or less. The decree of fashion, or the desire to conceal a defect or heighten a charm, is the reason of course. One woman, for instance, has a high forehead and wishes to reduce it in appearance. Another has worn off the front hair by continued frizzing, and would like to conceal the fact. Both make use of the front or top piece, with a choice of many styles. Women's wigs cost from \$20 to \$200. Hair wigs, top pieces, and switches from \$10 to \$50, according to quality.

The largest supply of hair comes from Switzerland, Germany, and the French provinces. There is a human hair market in Meilans, in the Department of the Lower Pyrenees, held every Friday. Hundreds of hair traders walk up and down the one street of the village, their shears dangling from their belts, and inspect the braids, which the peasant girl, standing in the steps of the houses, let down for inspection. If a bargain is struck, the hair is cut, and the money paid on the spot, the price varying from 60 cents to \$5 in our money. A woman's hair may grow to the length of six feet. And I know a woman who has been offered and refused \$500 for her crown of glory, which is over six feet long. A single female hair will bear up a weight of four ounces without breaking, but the hair thus heavily weighted must be dark brown, for blonde hair breaks under a strain of two and one-half ounces. There are some 2,000 importers, manufacturers, and dealers of human hair in the United States."—Washington Star.

At Cape Traverse, a very pleasant summer resort, is the Lansdowne, a large, airy hotel at \$1.00 up per day \$4.00 to \$8.00 per week. In Alberton there is the Albion Terrace and Wisner, each \$1.50 per day, 5.00 per week. In Tignish Railway, 1.00 per day, 5.00 per week. In Kensington, Clark's 1.25 per day, 6.00 per week; Commercial 1.00 per day, 5.00 per week. In Montague, McDonald 1.00-1.50 per day, 6.00 per week. In Mount Stewart, Clark's and Manson, each 1.00 per day or 4.00 per week.

The following hotels open for the summer season: At Hampton, Pleasant View, \$1.00 pr. day, \$5.00 pr. week. At Stanhope, Mutch's \$1.30 pr. day, \$5-7 pr. week; Cliff \$1.00 pr. day, 5-6 pr. week. At Brackley Beach, Shaw's, \$1.30 pr. day, 6-8 pr. week; Sea View, \$1.00 pr. day, 5-6 pr. week. At Rustico, Seaside, \$1.75 pr. day, 7-10 pr. week. At Malpeque, North Shore, \$1.00 pr. day, \$6. up pr. week. At Tracadie Beach, Acadia \$2.00 pr. day, \$8.00-10.00 pr. week. At Alberton, Seaforth, \$1.50 pr. day, \$7.00 pr. week. At Pownal, Florida, \$1.52 pr. day, 5-7 pr. week.

In addition to those already mentioned there are several other important and progressive towns and villages in the Province, all with ample Hotel accommodation, while the numerous comfortable farm houses prepare for the reception of tourists at moderate rates.
