Five Thousand Attended First Day Of The Fair

"Prince County Day" In The Main Building— Races Postponed But Midway And Grandstand Performance Well Patronized—Grand Champion Cattle Named.

Yesterday was "Prince County Day" at the Provincial Exhibition. The heavy rain on Monday night necessitated the postponement of the races, but despite the withdrawal of this outstanding attraction, the attendance was good in the afternoon and excellent in the evening when thousands thronged the main building, midway and grandstand. Between four and five thousand people attended. Prospects for to-day are considered splendid, the weather being fair and cool with a record attendance prophesied.

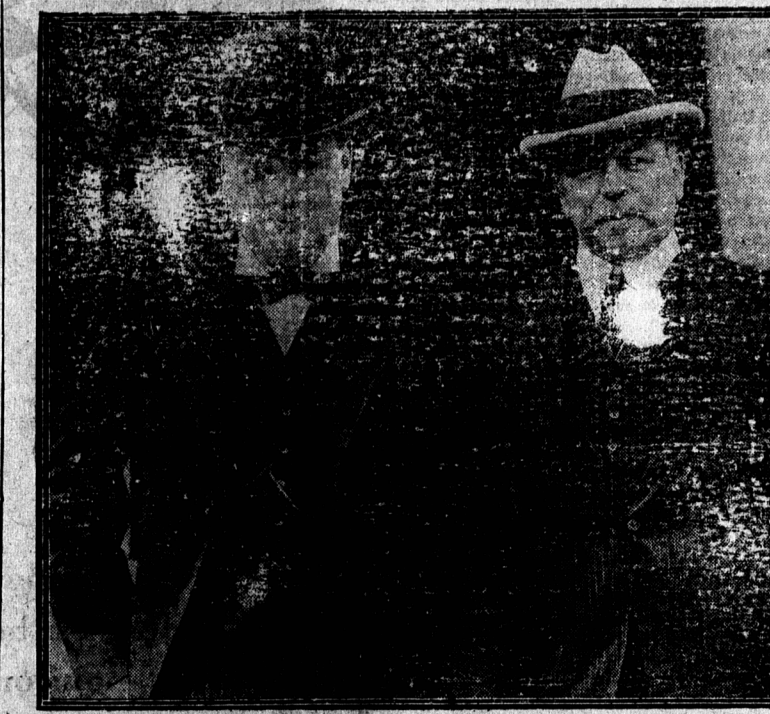
At 3 p. m. the main feature of the afternoon was presented, when musical artists from Summerside capably represented the western section of the Island. The programme was repeated in the evening. The absence of representatives from the other towns of Prince County was much regretted.

His Worship Mayor W. J. Lidstone, of Summerside, after being introduced by the President, Mr. Paton, paid a fine tribute to the organizers and supporters of the Exhibition. He deemed it a pleasure and privilege which the management had accorded in asking him to take part. He had listened with interest to the president's detailed account of the organization from its start to the present time and of the wonderful success it had met. He agreed with the Lieutenant-Governor in urging the necessity of mixed farming and felt that as far as Prince County was concerned a serious situation must be faced as many farmers had gone in for nothing but cultivation of potatoes and in many cases some are buying milk, being without any live-stock except horses. He also referred to the remarks of His Worship Mayor Yeo the previous evening and declared that the people of Prince County do not realize the benefits to be derived from the Provincial Exhibition. A County Exhibition had survived the village fairs with the result that there is now no interest in it. A great deal of missionary

WOMAN FLIER FOUND DEAD

REVENUE BOAT SCATERIE IN PORT

Collision Between Government Cutters In Straits Described.

The Dominion Government revenue cutter, Scaterie with Capt. Herma in command arrived in port yesterday morning for supplies and fuel. A more accurate account of the collision of the two cutters in the Northumberland Straits was thus obtainable.

It appears that very early Sunday morning about 12 miles off Cape George, N. S. the three cutters, Scaterie, Whippet and O-29 were cruising in the Straits, the latter two quite close together. Owing to the heavy sea, the darkness and the flying spray, neither crew was aware of the proximity of the other boat until the collision took place. As the bows of the cutters were smashed in, both sunk before the men were able to secure their belongings. The crew of three on each cutter escaped in a dory, and were picked up by the fishing schooner, Cheticamp, and later transferred to the Scaterie which took the men to Georgetown.

Mr. Parker Lund, Spring Park Road, Charlottetown a member of the crew of the O-29, who was interviewed by a Guardian reporter yesterday, states that if Capt. Burke of the Cheticamp had not sighted them it is doubtful whether they would have reached land.

Mr. Lund was unable to account for the accident which occurred very unexpectedly. Five minutes after the collision both vessels sank. There was no confusion in getting into the life-boats.

The Whippet, 38 feet in length, with a speed of 22 knots per hour, was commanded by Capt. A. E. Michaud, of Port Elgin, and the O-29, 50 feet long and capable of 22 knots, was in charge of Capt. MacLeod of Souris.

MUCH ESTEEMED CLERGYMAN PASSES AWAY

Death Yesterday Morning of Rev. Dr. Gauthier Will Be Mourned Throughout Province.

A distinguished clergyman of the Catholic Church and one of Prince Edward Island's most esteemed citizens passed away at the Charlottetown Hospital yesterday at 3.10 a. m. in the person of Rev. P. C. Gauthier, D. D., whose death occurred after a lingering illness, he having been confined to the Hospital for the past two years.

The late Dr. Gauthier was born at Rustico on May 14th 1856 and was son of the late Zacharia and Mary (Blanchard) Gauthier. He received a good district school education at Rustico and New Glasgow and made such progress that he was given a license to teach, which vocation he followed for four years. He was again a student for a time and then for four years engaged in teaching in St. Dunstan's College at Charlottetown, following which he went to Quebec and took a three years' course in teaching philosophy and French six years longer and then in 1902 became pastor of the Palmer Road Parish.

During the summer of this same year (1902) he conferred upon him the degree of Doctor of Divinity, Palmer Road Parish is an extensive one embracing about three-hundred and twenty five families, and his duties entailed a vast amount of work which Dr. Gauthier performed with great zeal and thoroughness.

The late Dr. Gauthier possessed not only a splendid education, both literary and theological, but was a natural orator as well, and his pulpit and scholarly, but were presented in a forceful and convincing manner. He was considered one of the best orators in Prince Edward Island, and never failed to thrill his hearers on the many occasions on which he was chosen to speak at outstanding events. Charlottetown citizens have heard him speak several times, a notable occasion being an address which he delivered when the old cannon found at Louisbourg was formally placed on Queen Square, and which was declaratory, being an address which he delivered in the French an English languages. Dr. Gauthier's services on important functions throughout the Maritime Provinces continued to be in great demand up till the time of his last illness.

During his occupancy of the Palmer Road Parish, Dr. Gauthier finished the
