MILK FOR PUPILS—During the past month each pupil of Notre Dame, Rochford and Queen Square Schools has been given a glass of pure rich milk daily. Individual glasses are used and each of the fifteen hundred pupils served is more than enthusiastic over this splendid scheme which by the way is the contribution of Rt. Rev. Mons. Maurice McDonald. The milk, tested by City officials, is served and the glasses washed in the brief space of from five to eight minutes—this time being taken as part of the regular recess period. Needless to say the pupils are very grateful to Monsignor McDonald who, in keeping with the large schools of other centres has made this idea feasible in three of our City schools.

FERTILIZER STEAMER ARRIVES—S. S. Patten, Captain Henriksen, arrived in port yesterday at 1 p.m. from Ghent, Belgium, with a cargo of 3,500 tons of fertilizer. The trip was made in 20 days. heavy gales were encountered most of the way, and at Cape Nord she was held up on account of a snow storm, otherwise she would have arrived here about Monday night. There are some 65 L. P. U. men engaged in discharging her cargo, working both day and night. She is being discharged at Bruce Stewart & Co. Wharf, where the Fertilizer Company have their large plant erected, which is in charge of Mr. Louis Sadder who is manager of the Island Fertilizer Company.

IN MEMORIAM

MRS. PETER SINCLAIR

At an early hour yesterday morning Mrs. Peter Sinclair, widow of the late Hon. Peter Sinclair, formerly a prominent and honored figure in the public life of this province, passed peacefully away at the residence of her son, Hon. Senator John E. Sinclair, Summerfield, in her 79th year.

Mrs. Sinclair, whose maiden name was Margaret MacMurdo, was a daughter of the late Archibald MacMurdo, of Kelvin. She was a most estimable Christian woman possessing those fine traits of character which won for her the affection and regard of her neighbors and a very wide circle of friends.

There are left to fondly cherish her memory four sons and three daughters: Senator Sinclair, with whom she had been residing for a number of years; Norris, in Summerfield; Archibald in Vancouver; Peter in Charlottetown, a former member of the Provincial Government; Adeline (Mrs. Major Lowther), Searletown; Mary (Mrs. Harry Saul), Regina; and Amy, wife of Rev. Alexander McKay, of Harvey, N. B. One daughter, Mrs. J. L. Douglas, of Charlottetown, predeceased her. Three brothers, Archibald, in Kelvin; Albert in California; David in Summerfield and one sister, Mrs. Catherine Walker of Wilmot, also survive her.

The funeral will be held on Friday afternoon. There will be a short service at the home after which the body will be taken to the Summerfield Church where service will start at 2 o'clock. She will be laid to rest in the cemetery nearby.

Wins Diamond Ring

Twenty-five words, written with sincerity, won Mrs. E. W. Schaefer, Murray Place, Halifax, Nova Scotia, the solitary diamond ring offered in the October "Dandeline" contest of Sterling Products (Limited).

Schooner Is Abandoned

HALIFAX, Dec. 14.—(C.P.)—The schooner Frank Baxter was abandoned late this afternoon and the crew taken aboard the steamer Clan Alpine, according to word received early tonight by the coast radio signal service from the steamer.

The Clan Alpine gave her position as 44.49 north, 52.32 west, or about 240 miles south of Cat Race. No details of the occurrence were given, except the fact that the derelict had been set on fire after the rescue to remove the menace to navigation.

The Frank Baxter was a vessel of 158 tons gross, and sailed from Cadiz for St. John's, Nfld., on November 2. She was owned in St. John's by A. Wareham, and was built 13 years ago at LaHave, N.S.
