

Rovers Edge Out Millionaires 7-6 In City League Game

An unearned run in the seventh inning gave the north-end Rovers a victory over the Millionaires and secured the Whalen managed squad the second position in the first section. The score after a bitter struggle was 7-6. The game was played on the new diamond in Memorial Field yesterday.

The losers trailing 6-2 in the sixth inning blew the four run lead with the winners going on to score the deciding run in the seventh inning on the strength of an unearned run.

Danny McCormack well known in these parts as a boxer and a boxing referee made his first start in the City League a good one as he spaced six hits over a six inning stint and gave promise that he will bear watching in the future games to come. Elmer Larter, the league's hard luck hurler, lost his third game in as many starts but is doing so with the same kind of performance as he always does, a bitter battle right to the finish.

The winners scored twice in the second inning once more than the Millionaires did. They added four more in the sixth inning while the losers were scoring three times in the fifth and twice in the sixth inning. In the seventh inning the break came for the Rovers as Higson got a life on an error, stole second and came all the way home on a wild throw by the second baseman.

"Buck" Whitlock relief hurler for the winners shut out the losers for the remaining innings on two hits. Whitlock and Elmer Ward led the winner's attack as they gathered two hits apiece while "Pat" Connors and Mike Hennessey accounted for two hits each for the Millionaires.

Bombers Defeat All Stars 13-4

HAMILTON, Ont., July 18 — (CP)—Frank Stranahan successfully defended his Canadian amateur golf championship Saturday with a dazzling display of skill, brushing off the challenge of Hamilton's Joe Stoddard, nine up and seven to go.

There was little sensational about the first 18-hole half of the match played in the morning, when the British amateur champ from Toledo, O., shot one-over par golf—a 71—to take a three-up lead.

But in the afternoon, the 25-year-old defending champion sized. He won six of 11 holes to end the match on the 29th. He shot three under par on the first nine holes in the afternoon and two under on the remaining two holes. Even on the 430-yard 11th hole, rated as one of the toughest par fours on the continent, he came in with a birdie three.

A red-hot putter provided the basis for Stranahan's afternoon success. He was dropping them with ease from almost any distance. His tee shots, as always, were down the centre of the narrow fairways. His second shots almost hit the green. On the short holes he smacked his tee shots virtually pin-high.

The players offered a strange contrast on the course. Stoddard, six-foot-five, at times affably chatted with spectators. At other times his nerves seemed to get the better of him and often he sat on the edge of the green, hunched over, his head in his hands, as Stranahan made his shots. Stoddard wore a huge white eyeshade to break off the glare of the sun.

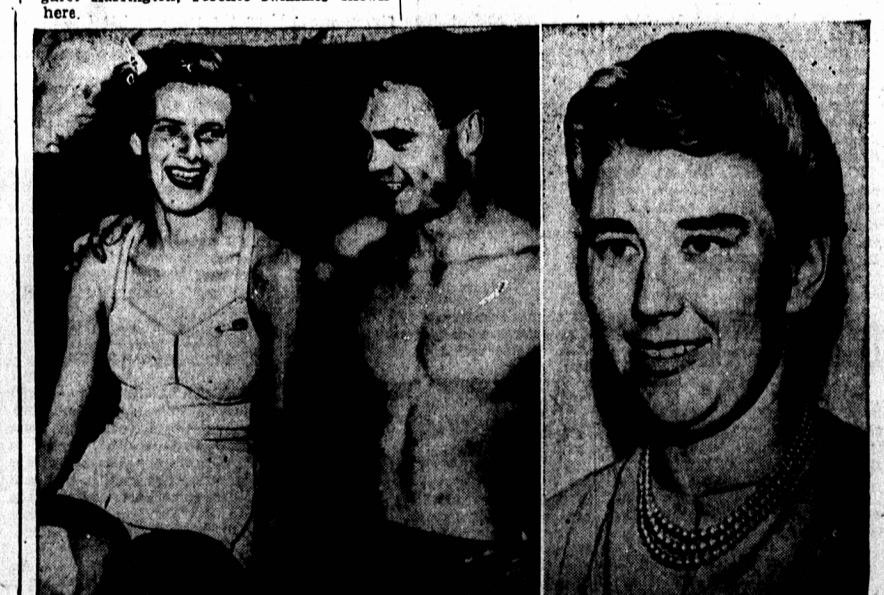

Nell Kalmuck Wins Feature Event Of Night Racing Program

Again showing the trotting form that has marked her performances the past couple of weeks Willard Kelly's Nell Kalmuck Saturday night trotted off with the feature event of the night racing program, the 220 trot as she headed a field of seven starters to win the tricky and third heat while placing second to Kelly's Nightmare in the second mile.

The event produced the best racing of the entire program. Taking the rail from Billie Kalmuck right after the word had been given Nell went to the front to make every post from there on a winning one as she stayed off the challenge of Kelly's Nightmare the entire mile to win by half length.

The second heat saw the same two horses stage another duel with the Nightmare snatching the rail to lead all the way. Nell was back in third place entering the stretch but in the drive to the wire moved up to within half a length of the leader.

In the final mile the Kalmuck mare duplicated her performance of the first heat taking the rail on the first turn and never being headed. Billie Kalmuck made his bid in the stretch but couldn't get up to the leader with Kelly's Nightmare dropping back to third and the rest of the field pretty well bunched a few lengths back.

Speedwell Guy had too much speed for the field in the No. 1 Classified Trot leading from wire to wire by two lengths from the other three horses being well strung out.

The veteran campaigner Jean Henley, driven by Chester Smith trotted two miles in 2:14 each trip to head the field in both dashes of the No. 3 Classified Trot and Pace. Jean had a big margin in both heats with Winnie Scott being second both trips. Miss Knox was third in the first mile with Lawrence Abbe moving to third in the second. Lee Brewer was fifth in each heat.

Random Harvest and Mary's Delight had a great battle in the No. 4 Classified Pace staging a finish that brought the big crowd to their feet. Going away on the pole Mary's Delight held off the challenge of the other starters for pretty nearly the entire mile but in the last few strides had to bow when Random Harvest, pacing a new jockey nipped the leader at the wire in an eyelash finish.

Allie Hal owned by J. Anner of Lower Montague had too much pacy ability for the other six entrants in the No. 6 Classified Pace, final event on the program, winning the dash handily with Nature's Boy placing in the runner-up spot. Lily Marlene was third with the other four horses being pretty well bunched a couple of lengths behind the first three under the wire.

The starting gate wasn't in use on Saturday night but Starter D. F. C. Dougan came through with another splendid starting job getting the fields away with a minimum of scoring and having the entire program finished shortly after eleven o'clock.

Aussie Shot Is Winner Of King's Prize

BISLEY CAMP, England, July 18 — (CP)—Percy Pavey, 46-year-old carpenter from Melbourne, Saturday won the King's prize to complete a virtual sweep for Australia of all the major trophies at this year's Empire Rifle shoot.

Scoring Australia's first win since 1907 in the classic of the National Rifle Association's meeting, Pavey finished with a 288 total, just two points ahead of Lt.-Col. Jack Steele of Guelph, Ont., who took second place.

Steele finished the match with a bloody nose, suffered from a snap recoil of the strange rifle he was using, a short-muzzled Lee-Enfield which he borrowed to replace his regular Canadian Mark IV for the longer ranges of the King's prize.

Pavey's victory in the King's, Australia's second since the match started in 1880, was the signal for a great parade led by arm bands with hundreds of cheering marksmen whooping it up in the traditional Bisley "chattering" as Pavey was carried around the camp on the shoulders of his fellow-Australians.

The N.R.A.'s gold medal was pinned on Pavey's chest by the Duke of Edinburgh while Field Marshal Montgomery stood by. Marshall had toured the firing lines during the shoot, stopping to chat with O'Connell of Frederick and Woods of Montreal.

The other big event Saturday was the Kolapore Cup. Imperial team match captured by the United Kingdom. The British team of eight rang up a total of 1,118 of 1,200 at the 300, 500 and 600-yard ranges. Canada was second with 1,112. Australia third with 1,091 and Jersey fourth with 1,091 and Querny last with the same score, 1,091. When totals are similar the placing of shots determines precedence.

The Canadians wound up without a major trophy. Only Canadian victory of the two week meeting, which saw nearly 1,500 of the Empire's best marksmen in action, came in the Elkington Aggregate.
