Hitler's Bullet Proof Car In Museum

PARIS, May 18 — (CP) — Unwilling to use a car with German associations, Gen. de Gaulle has decided to place Hitler's bullet-proof Mercedes-Benz, captured by French troops at Berchtesgaden, in a war museum.

The chauffeur who brought it from Berchtesgaden said: "All along the road, Germans and even Alsatians recognized Hitler's wagon. At night, I had to sleep in it to prevent souvenir hunters from removing fittings."

All cars Allied troops may pick up in Germany will be handed to the French to relieve France's transport problems, it is understood.

VISITS HOME ECONOMICS ASSOCIATION

The Home Economics Association held its monthly meeting at the home of Mrs. Walter Jones, Bunbury, on May 15th. King Attacks Social Credit Party Policies

EDMONTON, May 19 — (CP) — Canada's royalist monarch, King George VI, has bound up with the maintenance of peace and international economic cooperation in the world, the King said in a broadcast speech tonight.

Speaking here, in the centre of Social Credit party headquarters, King attacked the policies of that party and called for election of Alberta members to parliament who would be in sympathy with the Government's policies of cooperation for security and international trade.

Hitler's Sec'y Says Final Plot Fizzled

SOUTHERN GERMANY, May 18 — Adolf Hitler's principal secretary said today the fallen Fuehrer made one last desperate effort to split thousands of German soldiers to plan a story that the Russians were arming 200,000 Germans to attack the Fuehrer.

But when the plot fizzled, when front communications were broken, Hitler decided on the afternoon of April 22 that all was lost and declared he knew he would die in Berlin, said the secretary, General Hergeseil, who believes the Fuehrer lies dead somewhere in the capital.

The Inside Story

The secretary said he left Berlin that same April 22 for Berchtesgaden with thousands of pages of notes on the inside story of Germany at war in the last two years. A staff of clerks, he said, now is in a southern German city transcribing his shorthand.

After his arrival, Hergeseil claimed that as a result of the burning of his records — by whom he did not say — but a tremendous amount was recovered and given to him with an intimate picture of Hitler, his staff, their most secret deliberations and the names of hangers-on and women friends.

Hergeseil said he wanted to be helpful in translating the notes into English. He said he knew some of the notes, charged about the edges.

No Hitler Double

The secretary asserted that even after the Fuehrer's death in mid-April of splitting the Allies, only a few days before the end, Foreign Minister Ribbentrop and Goebbels had a meeting in Berlin to burn his records — by whom he did not say — but a tremendous amount was recovered and given to him with an intimate picture of Hitler, his staff, their most secret deliberations and the names of hangers-on and women friends.
