In Memoriam

CAPTAIN JOHN T. MACLAINE

People from many parts of the province were saddened to learn of the sudden death of Capt. John T. MacLaine which took place at the home of his daughter, Mrs. W. A. Field of Borden on Wednesday, February 7th.

Mr. MacLaine was born at Rice Point in 1858, and when quite young, with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Archibald MacLaine, he went to live at Rocky Point where he was sixteen years of age he went to sea. In those days a seaman's life was much different than nowadays. The old sailing vessel required able, skilful men who were not afraid of hardship and danger and Mr. MacLaine is among the last of these fine old seamen who were so proud to know. While a young man he sailed to the West Indies on a square-rigger. He was promoted to mate and afterwards to captain of sailing vessels and at one time operated his own vessels. When steamships came into use he left the sailing vessels and for twenty-five years was captain of the steamer Harland, retiring from the sea seven years ago.

Three years ago Mr. MacLaine visited the U. S. A. and while there was the guest of honor at a family reunion held at Hyde Park, Mass. This memorable event was attended by three brothers and two sisters of whom Mr. J. T. MacLaine was the eldest.

Mr. MacLaine was a life-long member of Zion Church, Charlottetown, and as he faithfully tried to follow the footsteps of his Master, he left us an excellent example of fine Christian manhood, an inspiration to all who knew him. Of a quiet, unassuming nature he was kind, thoughtful and courteous to all, and his life did not affect him any. He remained the calm, affable gentleman whom we regarded with deep affection and esteem.

Twice married, his first wife was formerly Miss Theodocia Sanderson and their daughter Mrs. W. A. Field lived with him. Mr. MacLaine lived to the age of 81. He was married to Miss Isabelle Lawson who also predeceased her husband some years ago.

Besides his daughter Mrs. W. A. Field there are left to mourn the following sisters, Mrs. John Pearson, Charlottetown; Mrs. Robert MacLaren, North Lake; and Mrs. Joseph MacNeill, Rosedale, Mass., and brothers Cowan of Needham, Mass., and George of Denham, Nova Scotia, Montreal, is the only grandson.

The funeral was held on Friday afternoon from the MacLaine Funeral Home where it was officiated by Rev. Carlyle Webster who also conducted services at the grave. The pallbearers were Messrs. Harry Drew, Herbert Ross, Herbert Anderson, and Donald MacKinnon. Interment was in the People's Cemetery, Charlottetown.

Born at Rose Valley, her maiden name was Christy Ann Matheson, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Angus Matheson, she had resided in Forest Hill since her marriage to Mr. McBeth.

Her funeral took place from her old home on Sunday, March 10th to Dundas Cemetery and despite the poor roads was largely attended. She leaves to mourn their loss, besides her husband, one daughter, Mrs. Arthur King of Charlottetown; two sons, Neil of Deroche, N. S., and John C. at home. Two sons predeceased her, Alex, who died at the age of thirteen, and Daniel, who enlisted with the 106th Battalion in the last war and died of wounds in France on Sept. 3rd, 1918.

There are also left one brother Rev. D. M. Matheson of Stellarton, N. S., and two sisters, Mrs. M. A. McDonald of Calgary, Alta., and Mrs. Mary McIsaac of Charlottetown.

Godoy Becomes Choice For Title Contender

MILWAUKEE, Wis., March 19—(AP)—Arturo Godoy of Chile, who came out of obscurity to win 15 rounds with heavyweight champion Joe Louis, today replaced Tony Galento as the National Boxing Association's choice as no. 1 contender for the Brown Bomber's title.

Fred J. Saddy of Milwaukee, chairman of the N. B. A.'s championship rating committee, placed Godoy's performance at the top of his review for the past quarter, ahead of Henry Armstrong's knockout victory over Pedro Montañez and Armstrong's draw with Cefterino Garcia.

The committee prefaced its quarterly list of champions—unchanged since December—with a blunt warning to Joey Archibald, featherweight ruler, that unless he signs for a bout with Pete Scalzo by March 28, the N. B. A. will relieve him of his title. Scalzo is no. 1 contender.

C. N. R. Operating With Surplus In February

MONTREAL, March 19 —(CP)—Increase of \$3,050,530 was reported today by Canadian National Railways in February net revenue of \$1,763,188, compared with an operating deficit of \$1,287,342 in the corresponding period of 1939. Operating revenue increased \$4,652,981 to \$17,722,756, compared with \$13,069,775, while operating expenses were up \$1,602,451 to \$15,955,508, compared with \$14,357,117. Increase of \$1,502 was shown in net revenue of \$3,434,984 for the two months ended Feb. 29, compared with an operating deficit of \$1,895,539 in the corresponding period of 1939.

A gain of \$8,759,711 was reported in operating revenues of \$38,324,491, against \$29,564,780, while operating expenses advanced \$3,429,189 to \$31,885,507, against \$28,456,318.
