FERGUSON MAKES POWER STATEMENT

Claims Premier King Read Memorandum Differing From Proposal.

TORONTO, July 2.—Declaring that Premier Mackenzie King, in his speech at Peterboro on June 18, had omitted an essential part of the Dominion Government's proposal to the provinces respecting waterpower rights, Premier Howard Ferguson issued a statement in reply tonight. It was accompanied by the correspondence between the federal government and the governments of Ontario and Quebec.

The claim credited to Mr. King, that the St. Lawrence development was being held up by the Province of Ontario, the statement asserted, "is so entirely without foundation that it could be made with none other than a political motive and is an effort to shift the responsibility from his own shoulders where it unquestionably rests."

"During the conference upon this subject between the Dominion and Quebec," Mr. Ferguson's statements

declared, "Premier King requested that all discussions and correspondence should be treated as confidential until the provinces and Dominion reached an agreement or came to the conclusion that it was impossible to agree."

"It is because of that understanding, which the provinces have scrupulously observed that I have up to the present refrained from making any statement upon this important subject. By his declaration at Peterboro, Mr. King has chosen to violate

that understanding and thereby releases the provinces from their undertaking in that regard.

"Not only," Mr. Ferguson's statement continues, "has Mr. King treated this agreement as a 'scrap of paper' but he has failed to keep his written promise to consider the last suggestion made by Ontario and communicate with me further, as shown by his letter of May 16."

The memorandum which Mr. King was quoted as reading on the platform at Peterboro, Mr. Ferguson de-

clared had never been submitted to the conference with the provinces, or communicated to Ontario and differed in a very vital respect from the proposition actually put forth by the federal government.
