Titus, American, defeated Field of Exeter for the diamond sculls and is looked on as a probable winner of this event.

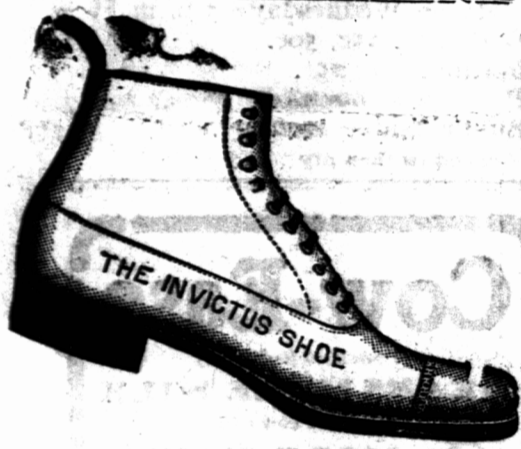
THE FLAGSHIP SAILED.

GRAND ENTERTAINMENT AT OPERA.

It must certainly have been disappointing to the management of Army Life that every officer and private in the city was not at the Opera last night. The large audience present, however, were delighted with the moving pictures because of the education and entertainment given. The pictures shown covered a multitude of phases of military life from the initial moments of the raw recruit to the thoroughly trained soldier. Included in the long list were illustrations of reserves at Aldershot, kit inspection, City Imperial volunteers at breakfast, dinner in camp, physical drill, cavalry training, with sword exercises, lanceurs drilling, officers and men of the various dragoon and lance corps, musical ride, medical corps at work, Royal horse artillery at Woodwich, artillery drills, army service corps and its work, transports and cruisers, old and new guns and methods of using them, hallographing, training of infantry, cycle corps, Royal Engineers at work, bridge building, exploding mines etc. Whether taken from an educational point of view or as an entertainment the pictures kept the audience in continuous storms of applause and repeated encores were called for. Especially was this true when the Canadian regiments were thrown on the canvass. Possibly the most taking picture was that of Father O'Leary and Rev. T. F. Fullerton clad in khaki. These desiring to acquire a vivid conception of army life should take advantage of tonight. Military men are asked to be present in uniform. This was necessary last night as the audience should certainly have kept pace with the spirit of the excellent entertainment given. The pictures given by this company are clear and steady, a great feature in moving views.
