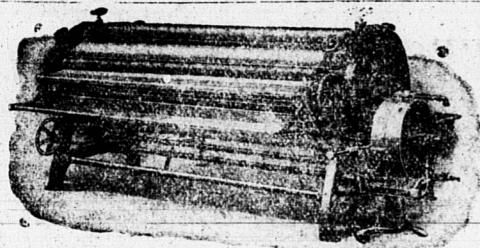

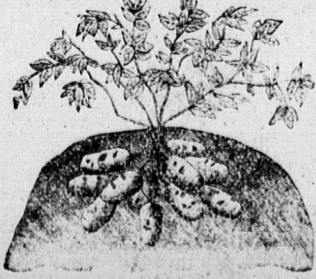

ARE RECOVERING BODIES FROM COAL MINE.

WELCH, W. Va., March 26—At an early hour today sixteen bodies had been taken from the shattered shaft of the Jed Coal and Coke Company's mine at Jed, W. Va., where eighty-two miners were killed by a gas explosion yesterday, and the men manning the government mine rescue car were confident that their work would be finished by noon. State Mine Inspector Nicholson was overcome by after-damp during the search and this caused a cessation of activities until ventilation can be improved. The condition of the bodies recovered convinced the searchers that there was no possibility of any one being left alive in the explosive zone. The Jed Mine, which is entered by a shaft 180 feet deep, is equipped with modern appliances and has had the most expert supervision. It is known as a gaseous mine. No dust was involved in the explosion and no fire followed, because the mine is always wet.

SUFFRAGE WINS IN MICHIGAN SENATE.

LANSING, Mich., March 27—With five votes against it, the resolution providing for women's suffrage passed the State Senate. The resolution required a two-thirds majority and it obtained 23 out of 28 votes. It is believed to have an excellent chance of passing the House also. At the last regular session the same resolution received a majority in the House, but it lacked a couple of votes of the necessary two-thirds vote.

PROMINENT MISSIONARY DEAD.

TORONTO, March 29—Rev. John B. McLaurin, one of the best known foreign missionaries of Canada, died today at his late residence, Robert Street, after a short illness. He was seventy years of age and one of the pioneers among Baptist missionaries.

The Guardian regrets to record the death at Tryone on Sunday evening, March 24th of Sarah, beloved spouse of Thomas Murray. The deceased, who reached her 84th year, enjoyed the best of health till a few months ago, and with her now disconsolate and afflicted husband lived and labored at the homestead in North Wiltshire till six years ago, when they moved to a comfortable little home at Tryone, alongside their daughter Mrs. P. D. Hagan. About two months ago Mr. Murray, old but vigorous and in perfect health, had the misfortune to have his leg broken and joint dislocated. During his wife's declining days he had the consolation of her presence, sympathy, and affection. Fortified with the last rites of the Catholic Church by her kind pastor, Father Curran, who is most vigilant in devising means for the spiritual and material comfort of the disconsolate husband, the deceased peacefully closed a life well spent in this world and now begin in the next. Her daughter Mrs. Hagan, and three sons, James J., Tryone; John, at North Wiltshire, and Thomas in the United States, survive. The funeral Mass was sung by her nephew, Rev. Dr. Smith, while Father Curran officiated at the grave. The pallbearers were—Charles Pollard, John Callaghan, John Clerk, Thomas Wyne, James Clerk and Patrick McArthur. Requiescat in pace.

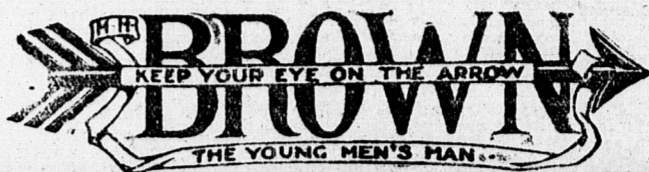

MARKING OF BARRELS AND PACKAGES MADE MORE STRINGENT

OTTAWA, March 27—The house today dispatched government business with much energy, a number of measures being advanced. The bill adding part of Keewatin to Ontario got a third reading. Mr. Monk's bill to increase the subsidy to fish docks was passed and so were several other bills.

Mr. Foster advanced his bill to amend the Inspection and Sale act. The clauses which render more stringent the provisions as to the marking of barrels and packages with the full name of the manufacturer or packer were passed. The minister, however, dropped the clauses prescribing the weights of various vegetables, including potatoes, with regard to the bushel, bag or barrel.

The house spent the latter part of the afternoon in committee on the subsidies bill. Discussions arose over two New Brunswick roads to the Beersville line and the new line from Albert to Moncton.

In the evening, Colonel Hughes' bill to grant \$100 to Fenian raid veterans was passed. After explaining the bill, Colonel Hughes announced his willingness to accept an amendment extending the grant to the survivors who may be living outside of Canada. Mr. Crothers supported this suggestion that the grant be given to veterans "living" instead of to veterans "now in Canada."

Mr. Lalor suggested that the grant be extended to widows. There was further discussion as to the militia called out for drill during the raid, but not sent to the front.

RIVER BURSTS INTO SUBWAY AT BERLIN.

BERLIN, March 27—The great subway tunnel under the Spree River caved in today. Eighty laborers working on the tube extension heard the roar of the water and fled to the nearest hoists, being whisked out of the working just as they filled with water. The damage will exceed \$1,000,000.
