THE DYING LEADING THE BLIND IN CLOUDLAND.

PARIS, March 30.—One of the most dramatic incidents of the war, which occurred when the fighting in Flanders was at its height, is now related. A lieutenant observer with a sergeant as pilot was ordered to locate a German concealed battery whose fire had become extremely troublesome. THE DYING LEADING THE BLIND IN CLOUDLAND.

"For a moment I believed my brain had burst. Then the dense fog shut all the surrounding objects from view. Despite my pain, I kept the machine at the same height in order to avoid projectiles, which were becoming scarce. 'Are you blind and shell began harder than try and. The smoke enshrouded us so thickly that it was impossible to see twenty yards ahead. Out of this hell we were endeavoring to rise when one shell better directed than the others burst just above our heads with a terrific crash."

"I continued in the same direction approximately for two minutes, when, to my astonishment, the lieutenant called out, 'Look out, man. Go up! Go up!' Quickly I twisted, raising the plane up, at the same time tearing away the weather vane from a steeple on which the machine had just escaped destruction."

"I thank you, lieutenant," I said, "you must excuse me, but I cannot see. But you are wounded?"

"Yes," he answered, "I fear seriously. Then, seeing I was turning my back on our lines, he said, 'Make a half turn to the left. More to the left still. That's right. Straight ahead now!'"

"Soon a fresh hail of bullets warned me that we were again above the German lines. Three minutes later the voice of the observer called, 'That's it. Here we are, I saw our men down there waiting for us. Shut off the spark and volplane gently down. I heard no more, but soon after, at the end of a spiral, our landing wheels grated on the ground.'"

There was a murmur among the bystanders, who saw the pilot blind forever, and the body of the lieutenant who had just breathed his last. But the pilot said, "All I regret is that I cannot do it again."

BURNING HOTELS IN SASKATCHEWAN.

WINNIPEG, March 31.—Since the Saskatchewan Government two weeks ago declared for Prohibition of liquor to begin on July 1st, except from wholesale houses and dispensaries operated by the Government, there has been an epidemic of hotel burning throughout the province. Since Saturday night hotels at Paynton, Roblin, Magee, Sovereign, and Walsh have been burned, with losses ranging from thirty to fifty thousand dollars, but all were well covered by insurance.

NO CAUSE NOW FOR UNEASINESS PARIS PAPER DECLARES.

PARIS, March 31.—The Temps in belittling a renewal of the spy scare since the Zeppelin raid a week ago, declares editorially that it can give every assurance that there is no cause for uneasiness in this respect now. It is said, however, and apparently upon official information, though such is not stated to be the case, that the widely circulated stories last July of German spies disguised as farmers and stationed at important railway centres to blow up tunnels and otherwise cripple the rail communications were well grounded in fact.

According to this newspaper's information these spies were stationed throughout the eastern part of France. Most of them were occupied on farms which were within easy reach of strategic tunnels. It was their mission at the first call for mobilisation to so cripple the railway system by dynamiting tunnels and otherwise injuring the roads that the transportation of troops would be seriously hampered. The Government, however, was cognizant of the plan in its every detail, with the result that before final mobilisation orders were issued, all of these spies were put out of the way and not a single railway accident occurred.

BELGIAN RELIEF \$35,000,000.

NEW YORK, March 31.—Colonel Millard Hunsiker, of London, vice-chairman of the Belgian Relief Commission in London, arrived here on the steamship Lusitania from Liverpool. Colonel Hunsiker said that he had come to the United States to confer with the heads of the American committee, and would be here several weeks.

There has been expended to date for Belgian relief, he said, "about \$5,000,000, contributed from all countries. The bread line in Belgium now numbers about 500,000 and it is growing daily. In Great Britain there are about 112,000 Belgian refugees, many of whom have been given employment."

FAMILY MADE LONG TRIP BY DOG TRAIN.

SASKATOON, Sask., March 31.—A. J. Bell, accompanied by his wife and three children, the youngest eight months old, has arrived at Prince Albert, after a journey of six hundred miles by dog train from Fort Smith. Where Mr Bell has been Government agent. The journey took 24 days, the first part of the route following the lakes and the rivers.


Mrs Bell is said to be the first woman to make this trip. Mr Bell states he met a party going into the north to make a preliminary survey for the proposed railway from Port Simpson on the Pacific Coast, two thousand miles to the Lay River on Great Slave Lake.

CAPTURED BY BRITISH.

LONDON, March 31.—A Capetown despatch to Reuter's Telegram Company says that a German camp at Platben, fifty miles north-east of Ukamas, German South-west Africa, has been captured by the British. It contained great quantities of supplies and horses and other live stock.

BELGIUM MAY BE GIVEN CONSTANTINOPLE.

NEW YORK, March 30.—C. F. Bertelli wires the American from Paris that the allies, after numerous conferences have decided to give Constantinople to Belgium as compensation for the wholesale ruin of her country.
