IN MEMORIAM

ALOYSONS MacLEAN.

The death of Mr. Aloysons MacLean De Gros Marsh, which sad event took place at his home on Nov. 1st, was a sudden and unexpected shock to his family and friends. The deceased was in his usual good health up to two weeks before his death, which was due to an accident while working with his team in the field, and despite all that loving hands and the best of medical aid could do he gradually became weaker and weaker. But death which no Power can resist, which no entreaties can stay or turn aside, claimed its victim and the good kind father breathed his last, strongly fortified by the last consolation of the Roman Catholic Church. There are left to mourn the irreparable loss of a member of their family whose thoughts ever centered in the home and welfare of his family, one son Roddie at home; Mary of Boston, Mass.; Margaret, Agnes and Carrie who were at his bedside when he died, his wife having predeceased him fourteen years. To soften the grief of the bereaved family it is consoling to know, that their loss is his gain, that he is waiting for them in that Kingdom he was so well prepared to enter. Two sisters and three brothers also survive. The sisters are Mrs. Jackson of Boston, and Mrs. H. Tanner of Souris, P. E. I.; the brothers are Luke, Medical Doctor in Pueblo, Colo.; Daniel of Halifax, N. S.; and Joseph living in De Gros Marsh. An unusually large procession followed his remains to St. George's, where a Requiem Mass was celebrated by the Pastor Rev. Father Gregory MacDonald after which he was peacefully laid to rest in the adjoining cemetery. May he rest in peace.

KING CO. DOMINION ELECTION

Ladies and Gentlemen, Electors of King's County. Greeting: Two years ago I was unanimously chosen by a large and representative convention of King's County electors, as a candidate for that County for the House of Commons, to support the Government led by Sir Robert Borden.
