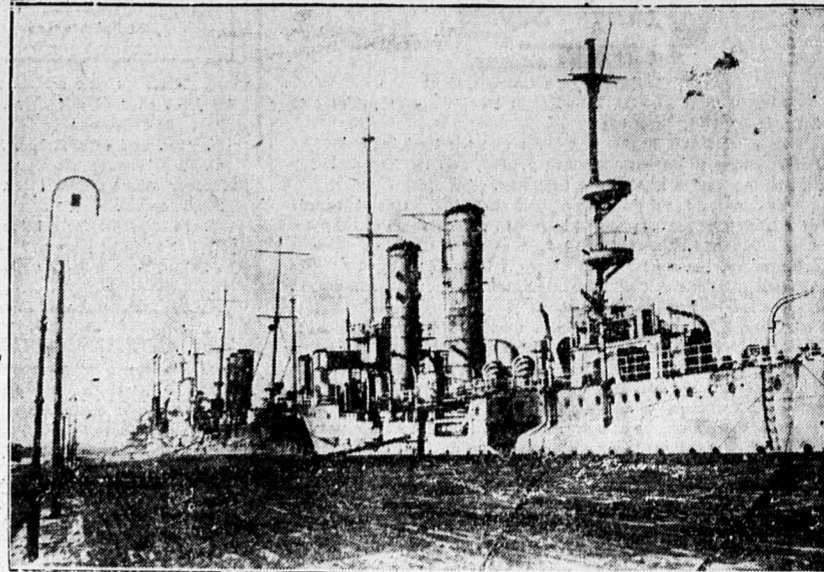
TO GRACE ENGLISH ROADS

These 12-year-old twins, Janice and June Thompson of Hollywood were winners in the recent Los Angeles twin beauty contest.



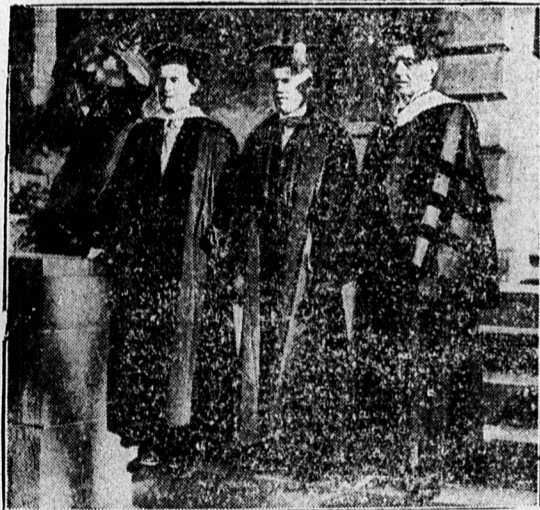
FOR 1931 RACES

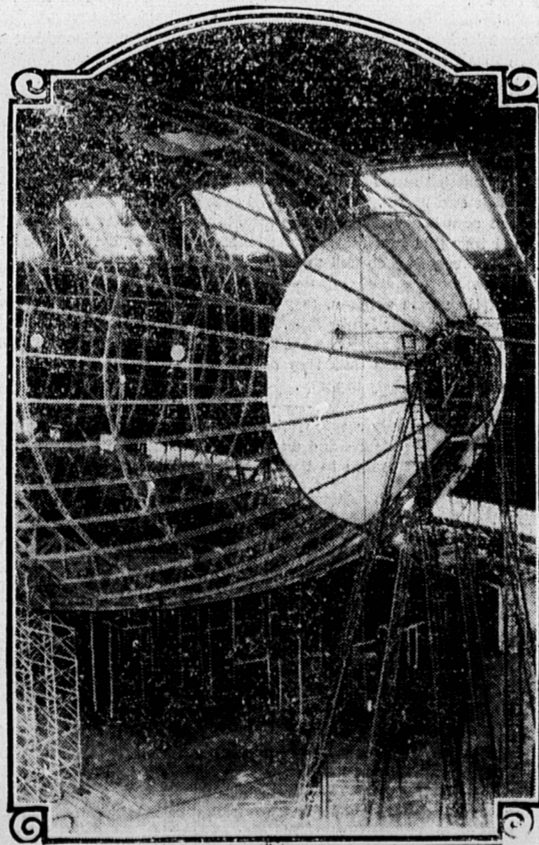
HONORED BY PRINCETON UNIVERSITY

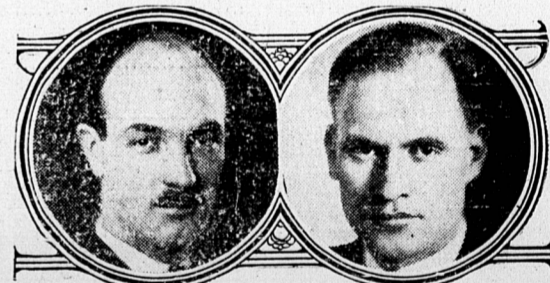
