British Tighten Home Front

LONDON, March 12—(AP)—Britain's wartime pleasures were curtailed tonight by a government that has pledged itself to an all-out war effort and a tightening of activities along the home front.

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The 35,000-ton battleship Alabama, above, fourth and last of a class of the mightiest warships now in the U.S. Navy, slides down the ways of the Norfolk Navy Yard, Norfolk, Va., preparatory to joining her sister ships in America's battle for freedom. She was launched after Secretary of Navy Knox predicted victory against the Axis.

New importance has been placed upon the Pacific Coast's Fishermen's Reserve now that war with Japan has brought a new menace to Canada's western frontier. Men of the Reserve spend long hours patrolling the myriad floods and bays of the B.C. coast. At left is shown a typical "reserver" of the Fishermen's Fleet. At right, one of the small vessels is shown as it ploughs through the Pacific swells.

The fishing season on the West coast won't open until May, but British Columbia fishermen are out hunting now — for bigger catches than salmon or halibut. They're after submarines and mines.

All up and down Canada's fjorded Pacific shores, fishermen — members of the Fishermen's Reserve of the Royal Canadian Navy — are voluntarily patrolling the seas, protecting their own home waters. Their vessels aren't cruisers or destroyers or even corvettes.

The ships in which they go to war are the same ones they made their living in — tiny wooden halibut boats and salmon boats. Today these boats sport coats of gray, and business-like wireless masts, and carry machine guns and paravanes instead of nets and hooks.

Organized by far-seeing naval authorities in 1938, the Fishermen's Reserve is playing an invaluable role in the defence of Canada. The hardy British Columbia coast, with its rocky approaches, is the West's greatest natural safeguard.

But it must be watched constantly since some of its inlets could serve as hideouts if submarines slipped through the protecting ring of British, United States and Canadian warships.

Before the war in the Pacific the Reserve was occupied chiefly in watching Japanese fishing vessels. Now, with the Japanese fishing fleet rounded up, Reservemen are on more exciting assignments — sweeping the sea-lanes for mines deposited by low-flying planes and undersea craft, looking for submarines and other signs of enemy activity.

As long as the white loaf was maintained on the United Kingdom market there was an incentive to have shipments made as far as possible in the form of flour which permitted of economy in shipping space, officials said.

Ottawa sources said they believed the switch from white flour to the United Kingdom would be accomplished by scientific use of the high vitamin qualities of Canadian wheat. British food ministry officials recently visited Ottawa to examine the milling process by which the vitamin B1 found in quantity in rust resistant wheat in particular, is retained in flour and bread.

If such milling processes were adopted in the United Kingdom, it would no longer be necessary to "fortify" bread and flour with vitamins as is the present practice.

way towards keeping feet healthy and comfortable. At night, after a restful, leisurely bath, is a good time to give your feet their weekly beauty treatment. Dry them well, then put cuticle cream or pure olive oil on and around the nails. Wipe the end of an orange stick with cotton and push the cuticle back. Cut the nails straight across and smooth any rough or sharp edges with an emery board.

Then apply a special foot cream or lotion, or even your favorite night cream using firm upward strokes from tips of toes to ankles. Rub it in well until almost all trace of the cream has disappeared. Remove the excess with soft, cleansing tissues and wash the nails with warm soapy water. Dry carefully and polish with buffer. Buffing is a circulation stimulator and should always be done before painting with nail lacquer. Dust with powder before you go to bed.

If there are any troublesome corns, don't try to treat them yourself. That is a job for a good foot doctor. If there is any indication that a corn may appear, get corn plaster and wear them faithfully over the irritated spot until it disappears. If the spot persists, this, too, is for your doctor to attend to.

An especially hard callous can be treated with pumice. Moisten the pumice before you rub and do not try to remove the entire callous in any one time. Thirty seconds rubbing is quite enough for one treatment.

Think twice, Madam, before you part with that old felt hat. Even if to your critical eye it looks past its best, and cut-of-date it is still an asset and may well be irreplaceable.

The best hat felt is made from the fur of Australian and European rabbits.
