DIES UNEXPECTEDLY — Mr. Francis J. McAree, 74, formerly of St. Augustus, died unexpectedly at the Russ Hotel early today. He passed away in bed about 1:30 a.m. Coroner E. D. MacGuigan announced the man died of natural causes and that no inquest would be held. Relatives include two brothers in Massachusetts.

NEW LOW FOR MARCH — After setting a new all-time low for March in this Province, a few degrees below zero, the weather moderated on Sunday until by 8:30 last night the reading was 22 above at the Charlottetown Experimental Station. Low Saturday night and early Sunday was nine below. At 8:30 Sunday morning it was six below. Apparently the cold was more severe in Charlottetown Saturday than in surrounding districts. At the airport it was 11 below. The presence of low March in this Province, and the records go back to the start of the century, was 15 below in March, 1923. There was no wind with Saturday morning's extreme cold. The coldest day in March last year was 10 above on March 12.
