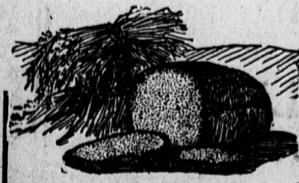

Supreme Court in Georgetown

The July term of the Supreme Court opened Tuesday in Georgetown with Mr. Justice Hazard presiding. There were three bills of indictment to be presented to the Grand Jury, an unusual number for Kings County where in recent years Judges have very frequently been presented with the white gloves symbolic of a clean criminal docket.

A true bill was found by the Grand Jury in the following case: The King vs. William Campbell, indictment for wounding one Roderick McKenzie with intent to do grievous bodily harm. The prisoner was arraigned and pleaded not guilty.

No bills were found by the Grand Jury on the following other two indictments. The King vs. Reginald Sterna and John Quinn, indictment for unlawfully harboring doubtful goods.

The King vs. Chas. Wayne (a minor) charged with assault occasioning actual bodily harm.

In charging the Grand Jury his Lordship expressed regret that the charge against a boy of thirteen, had not been disposed of in the Magistrate's Court. He congratulated the Grand Jury, as representatives of the County, upon the splendid appearance of the countryside and the progress of the crops.

On motion of Mr. Johnston, K. C. Malcolm McKinnon Charlottetown, was admitted as a barrister of the Supreme Court. On motion of Mr. Gaudet, K. C., Francis E. Doiron, of Mayfield, Queens County, was admitted to study law. The Court adjourned until 10.30 Wednesday morning.

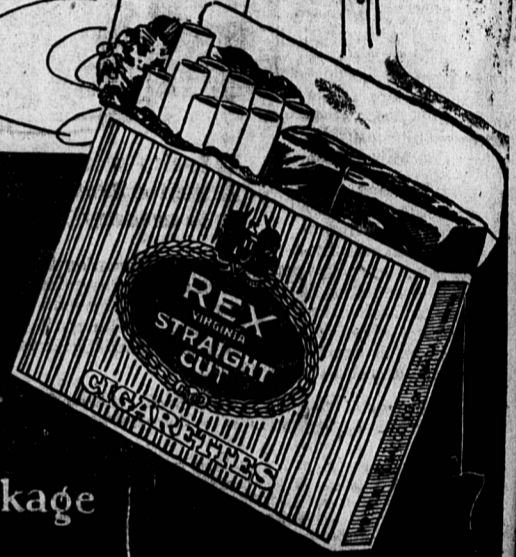

THE MARKETS

(Canadian Press)

MONTREAL, Que., July 20.—A moderate amount of business was done with foreign buyers in Canadian and American wheat and rye today. In the domestic market it was reported that a sale of 100,000 bushels of rye was made for export account, and some fair sized lots of Canadian Western sample oats at one cent per bushel under the Winnipeg July option C. I. F. Montreal. There was no change in car lot prices. The flour trade was without any special feature to note, prices for spring and winter wheat grades being unchanged under a quiet demand. Owing to the continued good inquiry for all lines of millfeed from both domestic and United States buyers and the somewhat limited supplies available at present the undertone was very firm and indications are that prices will advance in the near future. The market for standard grades of rolled oats was quiet, good prices were unchanged. Only a small trade was done for eggs but prices were firm. The receipts were 861 cases. The trade in all grades of butter continued very slow and prices were about steady. The receipts were 136 packages. The undertone to the cheese market was a shade easier which was attributed to a reduction in the foreign demand. Western grades were quoted at 18 1/2 cents to 18 cents and eastern at 18 cents per pound. The receipts were 8,506 boxes.

Bad Fire In Toronto

TORONTO, July 20. — Fire which broke out in the offices of the Canada Furniture Manufacturers, Limited, at one o'clock today, completely gutted the four story building, causing an estimated loss of \$250,000 to this company alone. A strong easterly wind which was blowing at the time, resulted in the greatest fire threat this city had known since the disastrous conflagration in 1904. The St. Lawrence market, and other buildings to the east were all threatened and the firemen were forced to play streams of water on all adjoining buildings.
