TRAINOR-MCKENNA WEDDING

The following marriage is taken from the Edmonton Bulletin of Aug. 25th, 1917: The marriage of Walter D. Trainor, with the firm of Webb, Read, Hegan, Callingham & Co., chartered accountants, Edmonton, to Miss Mary Josephine McKenna, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John McKenna, of Hunter River, P.E.I., was solemnized on Tuesday morning, Aug. 21st, at St. Mary's Roman Catholic Cathedral, Calgary, Rev. Father Hughes officiating. The wedding took place in the presence of a few intimate friends of the parties. F. O. McKenna, barrister, of Calgary, a cousin of the groom, was best man, and Miss Maud McKenna, sister of the bride, was bridesmaid. Bride and bridesmaid wore handsome tailored suits and black picture hats. After the ceremony a wedding breakfast was served at the Palliser Hotel. The newly married pair returned to Edmonton on Tuesday and a reception in their honor was given that evening at the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Schapirowski, 9633, 103 A avenue. Mr. and Mrs. Trainor will make their home at 9540 163rd Avenue, Edmonton.

The death occurred in Charlotte town at nine o'clock yesterday morning of Mr. John C. Hobbs, aged seventy-nine years, a well known and highly respected citizen. The deceased was a very skillful cabinet maker. He was at one time associated with his father the late John Hobbs in the furniture and undertaking business in the building subsequently occupied by the late W. E. Dawson. He was later with Mark Wright, and the late John Newson. Mr. Hobbs enjoyed good health until June last when he was obliged to give up work. He leaves to mourn besides his widow, the following sons and daughters; Frank, Mrs. John H. Saunders, Charlottetown, Mrs. Fred. Prowe, Murray Harbor, Mrs. Edythe Inman, Colorado, and Mrs. Annie Callbeck, Boston. One brother James Hobbs, of Boston and three sisters, Mrs. William Wright, Charlottetown, Mrs. Andrew Stiggins, Texas, Mrs. Freeland, London, Ont., survive him. The deceased was one of the oldest Masons on the Island and filled various high positions in connection with the Order.

He was made a Master Mason in St. John's Lodge No. 1 in December, 1859; subsequently he became a member of Alexander Royal Arch Chapter and Prince Edward Preceptory No. 35, Knights Templars and also a member of the Scottish Rite Bodies. For a number of years he has been Grand Tyler of the Grand Lodge of Prince Edward Island. The funeral will be held under Masonic auspices. Funeral leaves the house at two thirty p. m. Thursday for Peoples' Cemetery.

One of the oldest and most respected of the former inhabitants of Mount Herbert passed away at his residence Charlottetown on the 25th of August in the person of Mr. Francis Mutch in the 83rd year of his age. For 36 years he was a resident of Stanhope where he was the proprietor of "Mutch's Hotel," one of the most popular summer resorts on the north side of the Island. Having disposed of his property at that place he removed to Charlottetown about three years ago, and although not feeling robust he passed away quite suddenly on the above date. He always took a great interest in the various questions which agitated the public mind particularly the terrible war that is now causing such distress among the nations of the world. His faith was strong in the finished work of Jesus Christ and rested entirely on the cleansing power of His blood. His own righteousness he certainly regarded as "filthy rags" in the sight of an absolutely pure and holy God and trusted in Jesus Christ as his only Saviour. He leaves behind him a widow—nee Miss Annabella MacMillan—and one son, Francis Alex Allan, besides a number of grand-children and a host of friends and acquaintances. The funeral services were conducted by the Rev. D. MacKenzie, assisted by the Rev. Donald MacLean. The pall bearers were Messrs. R. T. Mutch, Ernest Mutch, Percy Mutch, Herbert Mason, Solomon Mutch and Mr. Frank Mutch of Earncliffe. His remains were interred in the Methodist Cemetery at Mount Herbert to await the resurrection morn.—Com.

Born in Lot 65 in the year 1843, Mr. McKenna lived in his native place until about thirty seven years ago, when he moved to Bedeque, where he has since resided, and where his large, fertile farm, his magnificent dwelling house, his spacious and well kept out-buildings bear ample testimony to his zealous and painstaking labors.

Mr. McKenna was in every way an exemplary Christian; he was fervent in the practice of his religion, kind and generous towards his family, honest, upright and charitable in his dealings with his fellowmen, while his quick wit and constant good humor made him a favorite with all. Those who survive their loss are his two daughters, Mrs. Thomas Campbell of Middleton, and Mrs. Peter McIvor of Newton and his son John at home.

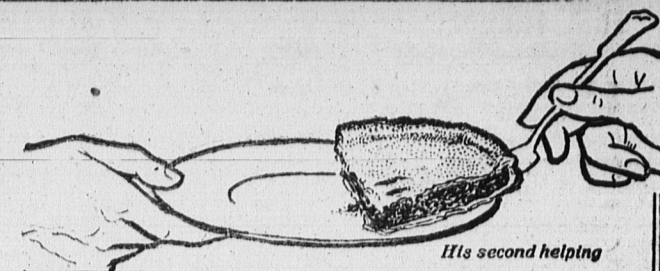
