Battleships To Be Brought From Mediterranean

(Special to the Guardian)

LONDON, Aug. 6.—For the third time in a century the major naval strategy of this country has been altered. That is the meaning of an announcement, printed in small type and without comment, by newspapers that four great battleships are to be brought from Mediterranean waters to home ports, ostensibly for three reasons: So that officers and men can get more home leave, because facilities at Malta are limited and because the harbor there tends to get uncomfortably crowded.

Ships involved are the battleships Queen Elizabeth and three post-Jutland superdreadnaughts, the Barham, Valiant and Malaya. When these ships return to home waters in November, they together with superdreadnaughts now here, will constitute the first battle squadron. Strength in battleships in the Mediterranean will be reduced from ten capital ships of the latest construction to five or six and these are not so powerful as those which are to come home.

Two facts of significance are learned about these unexpected disarmament plans. Britain will not scrap cruisers, as some of American dispatches indicate. Some at Washington think she ought to do so in order that the U. S. can catch up in post Washington Treaty cruisers. She is not unwilling to scrap certain battleships. Should certain first line battleships be scrapped the readjustment made would give Britain in the Atlantic battle fleet besides four ships now to be brought from Malta, the Nelson and the Rodney, Britain's two most powerful warships. The Iron Duke, Jellicoe's flagship at Jutland has already been withdrawn from the first line and will be used as a gunnery training ship.

Denies Rumors Of Election

(Special to the Guardian)

TORONTO, Aug. 6.—"I might tell you in confidence that this government is going to continue in power for some time. I may say that we have not even discussed an election. When we feel, however, that that time has come, we will not hesitate in declaring an election; we will not hesitate in going to the people of Ontario."

In those few brief sentences Premier Ferguson yesterday afternoon definitely dealt the body blow to rumors that Ontario was going to be the centre of an election this fall. He spoke at the 24th annual Lennox picnic at Jackson's Point, and approximately half of the crowd of 30,000 crowded around the stand to hear the premier make his declaration.

Public men today realize that they are merely the servants of the people, chosen by the people to put their wishes into effect, stated the premier. A few men who were not on the government were clamoring for an election. Yet the government did not feel like going into an election when there seemed to be no reason.

"In confidence I will further tell you that the government doesn't see any one on the horizon to fill their position," he continued with a smile and the crowd cheered. "And I don't see for some time that anyone will be on that horizon."
