The latest news, first of all.

Alfred Lyle, and Birchfield Yeo, Central, Lot 16, were among the visitors to the exhibition in this city yesterday.

Edward Collins and Stephen Coyle have been lodged in jail to serve a term of three months each for Prohibition violation.

There will be no services in the Hazelbrook Baptist Church on next Sunday Sept 25 on account of the church being closed for repairs inside.

At the recent Bachelors Sewing Contest held in Leslieville, Alberta, J. M. McDonald, formerly of Brookvale, P. E. I., secured third prize among a very large number of competitors. Mr McDonald was principal of Hunter River School, P. E. I., previous to going west.

The Plant Line autumn excursions to the Halifax Exhibition is only four dollars return sailing from here Sept 27th and Sept 30th and good to return Oct 5th and 12th. The rate to Boston, good for thirty days is but twelve dollars return as will be seen by the ad in this issue.

C. E. Pratt, St Peter's, writes The Guardian as follows:—Can the Northwest beat this? I sowed three and a quarter bushels White Russian wheat on one and seven eight acres of land. I threshed three thousand and nine hundred and twenty four lbs, or 65 24-60 bus clean wheat, also some tallends that I did not count. I shall be glad to hear from anyone who has bettered that this season. I bought the seed from Carter & Co., Charlottetown.

There passed away on Sabbath Sept 18th, 1910, one of the oldest and most respected citizens of Springton, in the person of Mary McEwan, relict of the late Angus Nicholson. The deceased originally belonged to West River, but was born in the Isle of Sky, Scotland, eighty-three years ago. She was a very intelligent woman yet very quiet and unassuming and was very well liked by all who came within the range of her acquaintance. She brought up a large respectable family two of whom live in the city viz:—Roderick Nicholson, grocer, and Miss Nicholson, also one son Malcolm on the old home-stead at Springton. Two daughters Mrs Peter McDonald, Emerald; Mrs. James Nicholson, Rose Valley; three or four sons in St Paul, and Minneapolis, Minn. She was a member of the Presbyterian church, Rose Valley. Her pastor Rev John Gillis conducted funeral services at the house and grave.

There died at Murray River, P.E.I. on the morning of Sept 19, Jane Ann Rattray, widow of the late Valentine Boyce, of Merald, Lot 48, in the 74th year of her age. She passed away at the home of her son-in-law J. D. Hume and was through a long and painful illness, lovingly and attentively cared for by her daughter Mrs Hume. Though suffering much she manifested a degree of patience which indicated the sustaining power of the spirit of God. No earthly friend could command more nor earthly skill produce peace in one so tortured by pain, but a LOVING SERVANT who giveth what the world cannot give comforted her and dwelt within her the hope of glory. Thus are many hearts consoled by her removal from suffering and by her entrance into an eternal joy. "There is a rest for the people of God." The deceased possessed a quiet disposition, a generous and hospitable nature and only the most endearing recollections survive in the memories of those who knew her. Her husband died nine years ago and since then she spent her time amongst her family, and of late made her home with her daughter at Murray River. Besides two daughters Mrs J. D. Hume of Murray River and Mrs William Bears of Charlottetown, she leaves five sons Uzziah and William of Lot 48; Fred and George of Cambridge, and James of British Columbia; all of whom were to see her recently except James who arrived too late to see her alive. The funeral services at Murray River and Lot 48 were conducted by Rev E. McDougall assisted at the latter place by Rev Daniel McLean. To the bereaved family The Guardian extends heartfelt sympathy in the loss of one so worthy of the affections and esteem of all.

The schooner Ida M. Clark, 99 tons, Capt Gilbert, owned by Alfred McLeod, F. E. I., and Wm McFarridge, Halifax, has left the latter port to engage in scaling. She will be absent a year.

Rev Dr John Kier Thompson, Congregationalist, who recently resigned his pastorate at Windsor Junction, N. S., is stopping for a time in this Province. Dr. Thompson was born at Malpeque, P. E. I., and was for thirty years a resident of Worcester, Mass.

The regular meeting of the Cheese Board was held in the city yesterday with a full attendance of salesmen and visitors present. The cable messages read 2800 cheese boarded at 11 cts each price 11c 800 sold, buyers present R. E. Spillet, A. J. Biffin, Geo Auld, R. E. Mutch. The following factories boarded cheese:—Kensington 580, Stanley 300, New Glasgow 300, Winslow 80, Hillsboro 50, Hazelbrook 35, New Perth 200, Orwell 150, Red House 90, Cornwall 105, St Peter's 85, New Dominion 75, Lakeville 100, Gowan Brae 65. All except New Glasgow sold to Mr Spillet at 11 cts. Harry Mitchell, (Maritime Representative Dairy Division) was present and addressed the meeting. His remarks were most encouraging and said that the cheese placed on exhibition this year were the best he had yet judged at any of our exhibits. (Mr Mitchell has been the judge for a number of years here). He sounded a note of warning regarding conditions during the hot weather when he found the curing rooms in some cases at a temperature of 86 degrees when 60 should be the normal temperature. He referred also to the improved condition in which our cheese reached its destination, claiming that this was due to the watch care exercised by the Department of Agriculture, in placing a man at the different shipping ports to observe conditions.
