Kiwanis & Gateways Win Two Straight

BAIN HURLS YARMOUTH NINE TO 4-1 VICTORY

Two Thousand See Gateways Take Strangle Hold On Series For Title.

GLACE BAY, N. S., Sept. 9.—Yarmouth Gateways were returning home today with victory in the Nova Scotia baseball championships almost certain and a second straight win in a three-out-of-five series with Dominion Hawks to their credit.

Yesterday they rocked Dominion's hopes of recovery from Friday's defeat in the first game of the series with a decisive 4-1 pummeling before a gallery of 2,000, and sailed on towards a probable meeting in the Maritime championships with the survivors of the New Brunswick series in which St. Stephen-Milltown Kiwanis have the same lead over St. John X. M. C. I. Maroons.

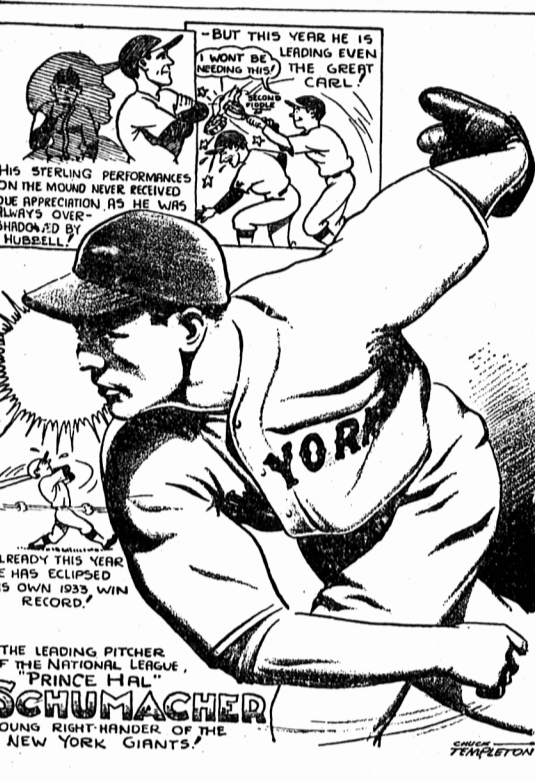
Impressive
Mighty as they were Friday, Gateways gave an even greater impression of their strength yesterday as they came from behind when it seemed likely the Cape Breton champions would take the second game of the series. Another feature in the defeat of the Hawks was some smart strategy on the part of Manager Ernie Grimshaw of the Gateways when he surprised everyone by placing Bain on the mound. The change of pace told heavily on the Hawks score sheet, and leaves the young Purvey Fuller a chance to clinch the series when the next game is played in Yarmouth Thursday.

McMullin Standout
Jimmy McMullin, stocky Hawks' first baseman, was their only hitting hero, and was the only one to make Bains offerings. He put Dominion into the lead in the first inning with a long three-bagger sent pitcher Gillis home after Lincoln had put himself on third with a three base walkoff. It was the only run for the homesters.

Yarmouth tied in the second with a squeeze play on Doug Horton's triple and Bains magnificent bunt; moved ahead in the fifth on Amiro's single, stolen base, and scoring hit by Cople LeBlanc. A four-hit rally by the Gateways in the eighth put the issue beyond doubt, as LeBlanc opened with his lead hit of the game, took second on Doug Horton hit into a double play with Veniot being nipped at second although Cople was able to reach third. With two out, Cople, regarded by many as a better pitcher than Smokey Joe Harty, was still unable to halt the Gateway's victory march, and Bains' nice double to centre to score LeBlanc later a single by

Yankees Win Doubleheader From St. Louis Browns With Timely Home Runs

(A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, Sept. 9.—New York Yankees used home runs at St. Louis today to win the long and short of a doubleheader, defeating St. Louis Browns in a 14-inning opener 6-5, then taking a six-inning sunset edition 2-1.
The second game was won by Lou Gehrig's 45th home run of the season, which scored Rolfe.
Selkirk Yankees outfield, hit one for the full trip in the 14th inning of the first game, ending a contest that had been scoreless from the eighth inning when the Browns scored two runs to knot the count at five each.
The schoolboy ("Schoolboy") Rowe and the rest of the Tigers 10 innings to squelch the stubborn resistance of Boston Red Sox and gain a 5-4 decision in the series opener at Detroit.

A homer by Earl Averill in the ninth inning tied the second game for the tribe and in the 10th Johnny Burnett won the game with a home run when two men were out.
Hal Trosky knocked out his 32nd homer of the season in the first game, bringing two men across the plate ahead of him.
Dave Harris' 10th inning double gave Washington a 2-1 victory over the White Sox in the second game of a doubleheader at Chicago, after the Chicagoans had pounded out an 11-3 victory in the opener.
Settling a pitchers' duel between old Alex McCall and Phil Gallivan, that saw each allow only one unearned run during the regulation time, Harris' two bagger scored Ossie Bluege, who had singled and advanced on Stone's sacrifice.
Four home runs featured the opener. Circuit clouts by Harris and Fred Schulte helped give Monie Weaver a 3-2 lead in four innings, but Zeke Scars' 24th rounder tied the score in the fifth.
As was the case in the first game it was strictly a hurling duel between two crack southpaws and once again Bolger of the Hawks was forced to accept defeat after hurling a brand of ball that would have won almost any other game. He was nipped for seven safe hits, three of them of the scratch variety, and struck out seven.
But two timely blows in the second and fourth by Currie and McQuarrie drove home "Tie" Williams from third each time with the only runs of the game.
After granting two safeties in the first inning Larter, the winning hurler, went on from there to hold the Hawks hitless and runless for the next eight frames. It was a great exhibition of pitching and it also enabled the "portsider" to complete the season without a defeat being chalked up against him.
Two errors in the Hawks' half of the eighth put runners on second and third with none out and the head of the batting list coming up. Larter showed his mettle however, forcing the next two hitters to pop up, the third being an easy infield out.
Immediately after the game President E. F. Acorn presented the league trophy to Manager Tom McFarlane, congratulating him on his team's win and the capable way in which he has handled his squad all through the schedule.

DARKNESS HALTS U.S. TENNIS PLAY

Allison And Stoenen Deadlocked in Play—Czechoslovakia Is Eliminated.

FOREST HILLS, N. Y., Sept. 9.—Darkness stepped in this evening and took up where rain had just finished three days of complicating the final stages of the men's United States singles tennis championships.

Lester Stoenen, the giant Californian, and Wilmer Allison, the slight Texan, fought through 2-1-3 hours in a quarter-final match only to have dusk halt the battle with them all even at the end of the four sets. The scores were Allison 8-6, 4-6, 11-9, 6-9.

Fail to Play

Fred Perry, defending champion from England who was scheduled to entertain the crowd of 10,000 in another quarter-final match with Cliff Sutter, New Orleans, never did make the courts because of the halting of the Stoenen-Allison tussle.

The net progress was to clean up the fourth round completely with two matches in which young Lawrence Currie, 18-year-old Lawrenceville student, played his finest tennis of the season to eliminate the giant invader, Roderich Menzel of Czechoslovakia, 3-6, 7-5, 6-3, 6-2, and Vernon C. Kirby, South African southpaw, outdistanced big ball-erratic Donald Budge, of Oakland, Calif.

Tomorrow Stoenen and Allison will finish their quarter final match and Sidney B. Wood, Davis Cup star, will meet Parker in the lower half of the brackets. The winners will meet in one semi-final Tuesday.

Result of Draw

In the upper half of the draw Perry will try again to get at Sutter, second Davis Cup singles player, will meet Kirby with the winners of these two tussles coming to grips likewise on Tuesday in the second semi-final. The final is scheduled for Wednesday.
While Parker had too much stamina and was too steady for Menzel, and Kirby was a rock against which Budge finally wore himself out with his powerful but erratic shotmaking, Allison and Stoenen were a couple of evenly matched battlers who were knocking each other down all over the place and might have continued doing so for many more hours if darkness hadn't stepped in.
There was plenty of feeling between these two for it was Allison who answered an SOS from Davis Cup officials and hurried overseas to take Stoenen's place on the doubles team as George Lott's partner—only to find when he got there that Lester had won back the place.
