Amid the cheering and the waving of handkerchiefs the throttle of the engine was opened and the beloved Pastor of St. James' Church was going away from his home and all its tender associations. As the train pulled around the curve amid the cracking of torpedoes, and the shrieking of whistles, the band broke forth in the familiar air of "Auld Lang Syne" and in a few seconds the company broke up to return to their homes.

The Picton Advocate says: We learn with much satisfaction of the step taken at the last meeting of the Town Council, towards obtaining a suitable supply of water for our town. Mr. F. C. Coffin, of Boston, the gentleman with whom negotiations are now proceeding, is an engineer of many years experience. Ten years ago he planned and introduced a system of waterworks in Charlottetown and so satisfactorily did he perform the work, that he was this year entrusted with the contract of introducing a system of sewerage there. From our contemporary we learn that Mr. Coffin visited the town last week and went over the ground in the vicinity of the Simpson Springs and Boar's Back, with the Mayor and ex-Mayor Hamilton, and he thinks so highly of the prospects of obtaining from a quarter a half million gallons of water per day, that he subsequently advised the Council to have a test made before proceeding in any other direction.
