BADEN-POWELL'S EFFORT TO SOLVE THE BOY PROBLEM.

General Baden-Powell's solution of the boy problem is one of the greatest forward steps of the time. It is only incidentally that the Boy Scouts are placed under semi-military discipline. Nothing is farther from the thought of the general than the creation of the military spirit. Patriotism and love of country are inculcated, but not the sort that turns the recruiting sergeant's shilling into a badge of loyalty.

The problem that General Baden-Powell set himself to solve was a difficult one. The people of England are becoming largely town-dwellers. The old days when the boy could get plenty of scope for his restless energy on the farm or in the forest, or on the village playing-green have passed, and the boys of the town are growing up without the opportunity of training the hand, the eye, or the intelligence. The "hooligans" of East London, the "larrikins" of the Australian cities, the street-corner gangs of our own Canadian cities, afford ample evidence of what channels the perverted energy of the town boy makes for itself. To organize and inspire the boys of the country with high ideals of citizenship, to train their faculties of observation and their hands in manual skill was a threefold task of extraordinary difficulty.

No one who has looked closely into the operations of the Scouts can deny that in the space of a little over two years 250,000 British boys have had their feet set in the way that leads to strong, self-reliant manhood. Some one has called the Scout's obligation "The Ten Commandments made fascinating." The

A STATESMAN'S MONUMENT.

Among the statesmen whose memory the people of the Dominion of Canada hold in high esteem a place will be permanently assigned to the late Sir Leonard Tilley. It was every way fitting that his claim to public regard should be recognized by the people of the province of New Brunswick, to the service of which a very large proportion of his life was assiduously and usefully devoted. The monument, designed to commemorate his public career, has been appropriately erected in the very heart of the city of St John, which was his home, and on a spot close to the place where he carried on a successful private business before he entered public life.

In 1851 at the age of thirty-three, he became a member of the New Brunswick Legislature as a protectionist Liberal, and he retained his seat almost continuously until Confederation, when he entered the first Canadian House of Commons as a member of the first Macdonald ministry. When it retired from office in 1873 he became lieutenant-governor of his own province, but he returned to his former seat and portfolio in 1878. Failing health caused his permanent retirement from parliament, and he filled the position of lieutenant-governor from 1885 till his death in 1893. Sir Leonard's reputation stands high among public men for his consistent support of prohibition even when it

Scout is taught to be considerate and courteous to everyone, and the lesson is enforced by the obligation to try his best to do a good turn to somebody every day. How this works out in practice is very well illustrated by a writer in The Outlook, who says: "One thing that has always struck the traveler in England, particularly the American traveler, is the obsequiousness and the almost cringing habit of poor people, men, women and children, when performing some little service, always, of course, with the inevitable tip in view. The Scout law 'a Scout is courteous,' is killing this noxious habit. The first thing the Boy Scout learns is that he must not accept tips for little services done, such as pointing the way to a traveler, opening a gate, or giving a hand."

In very many similar directions the boys are being taught the greatest lesson of life—that of loving one's neighbors. Here and there the method of teaching and of carrying out the obligation to do a good turn to somebody every day may make a little Pharisee or a prig, but for innumerable thousands the result cannot fail to be wholly beneficial. The Scout organization is extending all over the empire, and is now being introduced into the United States. It will do much for the raising of the standard of citizenship when the Scouts come to manhood, and in the meanwhile it will furnish a very greatly needed outlet for the energies of thousands of boys who in sheer thoughtlessness and excess of animal spirit might fall into evil habits if left unsupervised on the streets.—Toronto Globe.

SHEA'S WHARF SINKS.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., September 12.—Shortly before midnight and just as the Allan liner Monrolian was being got ready to proceed on her voyage to Glasgow, the central part of Shea and Company's big pier, which is scheduled over collapse, and suddenly amount of goods which must be badly damaged, if not totally destroyed. It is thought that on the submerged part of the pier were stored about 2,500 barrels flour, 2,000 sacks flour, 1,000 sacks cattle feed and 200 iron pipes, representing several hundreds of tons dead weight.

NAVAL MAN IN POLITICS.

OTTAWA, Sept. 12.—Commander of the Canadian Navy, made a speech at the exhibition directors' luncheon today which is certainly calculated to earn him some notoriety. While claiming any desire to meddle in politics, this naval officer, who has been four months in Canada, denounced in indignant terms, all those who ventured to disparage the government's naval policy. He particularly deprecated the term, "tin-pot" navy.

I. C. R. TO RUSH WORK ON NEW BUILDINGS AT CAMPBELLTON

OTTAWA, Sept. 12.—A. W. Campbell, minister of railways, returned today from Campbellton. He states that the intercolonial board of management has approved of the plans for the buildings to replace those of the road destroyed in the recent fires.

The buildings will be more extensive than the old ones which were burned. The new station, for which tenders will at once be called, will be a big improvement on the old. The new engine shed will cost \$125,000, and owing to the need for this building work has been commenced upon it already. No time will be lost in starting work upon the coal sheds and other structures.

REV. D. HUTCHINSON ELECTED PRESIDENT

ST. JOHN'S, Sept. 12.—At a meeting of the Baptist ministers of the city yesterday, the following officers were elected for the ensuing year: President, Rev. D. Hutchinson; secretary, Rev. G. D. Millberry; program committee, Rev. Messrs. W. R. Robinson, W. Camp, and F. H. Wentworth. It was decided to send aid to Rev. G. W. Sherman, the Baptist minister in Campbellton, but no action was taken regarding the form the assistance would take.

NEARLY REACHED IRELAND.

LONDON, Sept. 12.—Loraine, the actor, who during the last few months has developed into a daring aviator, all but accomplished an aeroplane flight across the Irish Sea today. Starting from Holyhead, Loraine directed his course to Dublin. Although he had trouble with his engine, he got within two miles of the Irish coast. The breaking of a wire then forced him to descend to the sea. He swam ashore, and his aeroplane was picked up by a steamer. The distance across the channel is about 55 miles.
