PORT ARTHUR AGAIN.

Still another bombardment of Port Arthur has taken place and further damage has been inflicted upon the Russian fleet in that port. This is in pursuance of the double object of destroying or capturing the Russian ships and capturing the famous stronghold under whose guns the fleet is sheltered. We do not know as yet what progress has been so far made in landing troops in the vicinity of Port Arthur, and it cannot be hoped that the fortifications can be reduced by a naval attack alone. The furious bombardment is, however, likely to demoralise the garrison to some extent and prepare the way for a later attack in force by sea and land. It seems not improbable that the Japanese may yet capture Port Arthur, and it will be a great point gained when they do so. The task must be, however, a grave one, if we recall how long a siege Sebastopol sustained before the allied forces captured it.

GRANVILLE NOTES.

Pearly Stream Division of the Sons of Temperance No 200, celebrated their 10th anniversary this year by having a temperance sermon preached in the Methodist church on Sunday, Feb. 14th by the pastor Rev. G. A. Sellar. Mr. Sellar first stated to the large congregation that he was pleased to have the opportunity of giving a temperance sermon in behalf of the members of such a grand institution as the Sons of Temperance. His sermon throughout was a very interesting, logical and forcible one. Among the many important facts he gave he described the great danger that lay in the paths of intemperance, claiming that the only safe road to which was that of total abstinence. He strongly denounced the moderate drinker, they setting an example that many would imitate and after find themselves an established drunkard. Thus they have a greater influence for evil than a drunkard as no man ever seeing a drunkard would ever wish to imitate

him. He did not have backbone or interest enough in the welfare of his country to echo a voice that would help a temperance reform. He gave some statements from a reliable institution claiming that the alcoholic beverage that is drunk to-day is largely made up of poisonous drugs and other chemicals and that only enough of the real genuine article was on the market to keep up the reputation of the adulterated so that the danger is much greater than heretofore in drinking a beverage made up chiefly of deadly poisons. Mr. Sellar was horrified to state that many times our government and even civic authorities were supported and elected on the strength of the liquor parties and robbing many people of their just rights. He closed his eloquent discourse by saying that total abstinence was the only safe remedy for man and prohibition for the state. This he proved by the divine and supreme laws. At the last meeting of Pearly Stream, Division the vital question of matrimony was brought up for discussion. The question was "which affords the greatest pleasure married or single life." Bro. A. K. Henry opened the debate with a well chosen speech taking the side of married life. He was followed by Bro. Jas. Taper who argued to the opposite, referring to the great percentage of marriage contracts which ended in divorce, particularly so in the United States and he did not think that showed married life to be a pleasure. Others who took part in the discussion were Bro. Chas. McLeod, Bro. Hugh McKay, Bro. A. C. Taylor, Bro. Thos. Wigmore, each setting forth strong arguments on his side. It was then moved and seconded that the question be decided in favor of married life which was carried by a slight majority. The question for debate next meeting is: "Is man the architect of his own fortunes or a creature of circumstances. The recent thaw has made some very dangerous places on the public roads.—James Burgone came near losing a valuable horse in a water ditch near Mrs. Thos Taylor's.—Our mail driver Jas. Warren had on Tuesday to go about six miles out of his way in order to avoid this same piece of road. The cause of this road being bad when it thaws is owing to the narrow archway in the bridge. It is to be hoped that our road inspector will get an introduction to this bridge when he makes his next call.

MEETING OF PRESBYTERY.

The quarterly meeting of the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island was held yesterday in St. James Hall. In the forenoon session Rev. A. Craise, Mount Stewart was elected Moderator and some routine business transacted. At the afternoon session a petition was presented from the session of St. James' Church which is composed of the Moderator Rev. T. F. Fullerton, T. C. James, A. L. Brown, David McPherson, and David Small, asking that the session be dissolved because of the fact that it was equally divided leaving the burden of decision on the Moderator, and that a new session be elected by the congregation. T. C. James was heard in support of the petition. He set forth the duties of a session and showed that in the present case the Moderator had the duty of deciding imposed upon him whereas the session should be an intermediary between the congregation and the minister. After some discussion a motion carried that the petition of W. B. Robertson be heard in connection therewith. The petition set forth that the petitioner had been a member of St. James' church for twenty years, that he had been superintendent of the Sunday School for over a year and that, having been elected by the congregation as a member of the session a majority of the session had declined to allow his admission to that body. David Small followed narrating the steps in connection with the election of Mr. Robertson and detailing the incidents at the regular annual congregational meeting of the church. While speaking of the action taken on several occasions in connection with the work of the session the point was raised that the matter should be discussed with closed doors. A motion to that effect carried and those who were not members of the Court withdrew. After discussing the question at some length it was decided to dissolve the session and commissioners were appointed to act with the moderator in constituting a new session.
