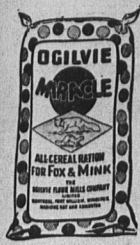

TORONTO, Feb. 23-(CP)-In a dribble of trading that resulted in turnover of only 71,000 shares, the smallest since Sept. 28 last, the market was only within recent weeks that her conditions were diagnosed as serious and news of her death came as a surprise to many friends and acquaintances.

Mrs. Godfrey, who was before her marriage Miss Eva Godkin daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Isaac Godkin of Charlottetown, was in her 68th year. With her husband and family she came to Picton from Charlottetown in 1903, and during her years of residence here she established herself in the esteem and affection of a wide circle of friends. Quiet and gentle in manner, her life was filled with deeds of unobtrusive kindness. Mrs. Godfrey will be cherished by many to whom she proved herself a real friend. She was a member of the former Methodist Church.

Besides her husband she is survived by three sons: Arthur, of Picton; Hollis, of Arlington, Va.; and Alfred at home, and four daughters: M. S. Peter A. Rydard (Elsie) and Mrs. Bernard C. Day (Gladys), both of Springfield, Vt.; Mrs. J. S. Waugh (Jennie) of Charlottetown, and Mary at home. She also leaves five grandchildren: one brother, Art Godkin, and a sister Mrs. Seymour MacInnis, both of Charlottetown.

Grain

WINNIPEG, Feb. 23-(CP)-Wheat futures prices suffered small losses during yesterday's brief session on Winnipeg grain exchange as buyers remained out of the pit in large numbers. At the close quotations were 1-4 to 1-2 cent lower, May wheat at 77 1/2 and July 78 7/8 cents a bushel. Buying attributed to mills and domestic in a rest took some of the slack out of the market but was not sufficient to absorb all of the offerings from hedgers.

In the coarse grain pit, crushers bought fair quantities of flax as prices in that commodity slipped 1-2 to 1-1 cent under the previous close.

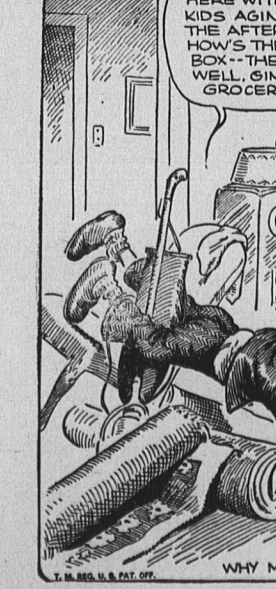
THE BAPTIST CHURCH

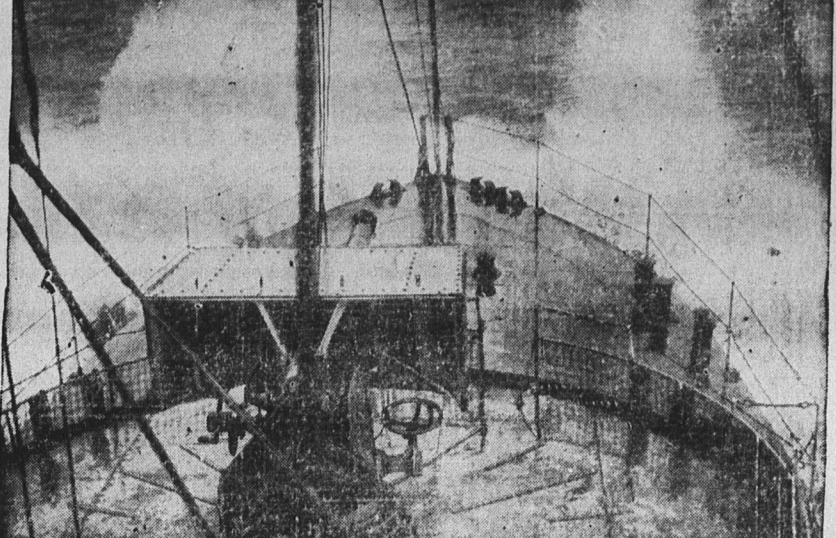
