Sir Timothy Intervenes

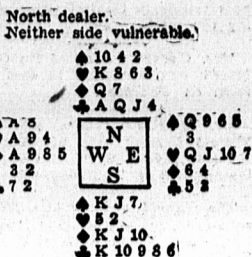

Contract Bridge

A Costly Blunder

In today's deal, West's shrewd opening lead should have killed the opponents' slam, but East made a horrible mistake.



North, of course, could have clubbed the opponents' diamond suit, but he did not want to announce first-round control and in that way discourage a diamond lead. He recognized that the trump suit might not be solid, and if a heart was opened the opponents might get the "jump."

Despite this cautiousness on North's part, West decided that there was probably nothing to be gained by opening partner's suit, and made the surprise attack of a heart. Declarer put up the ace from dummy then cashed the ace and king of clubs and followed up with the club queen.

It is obvious enough that East should have ruffed this trick with the spade king and laid down a high heart with the greatest dispatch. Apparently, however, East had a different conception, because he ruffed the third club with the spade seven! Declarer over-ruffed with the eight, then led the spade queen toward dummy. He took a long time in deciding whether or not to finesse because it seemed incredible that East, with an original holding of king-seven in spades, would have exposed himself to such a catastrophe. However, South knew that East was not a good player, and so (perhaps largely on a hunch) South went up with the spade ace to dummy. When the king fell the dummy was as good as made. A club now drove out West's stopper and established dummy's fifth club for a great discard. Declarer still had to lose one heart trick but that was all!
