A THIRD WINTER STEAMER.

A despatch from Ottawa to The Patriot tells that Minister Prefontaine has assured our representatives that it is intended to build a powerful steamer at a cost of \$250,000 to ply across the straits winter and summer. This is good news. And we warmly commend the Government on their decision and their supporters from the Island for their good offices in this connection.

Readers of The Guardian are familiar with the fact that this journal was the pioneer in the advocacy of the second winter steamer, and kept up the agitation continuously until the Minto was placed on the route. In like manner The Guardian was the first newspaper to point out

the necessity for another and more powerful winter boat at a cost as is now pointed out. It is most gratifying that these views, fully supported by the Board of Trade and other influential agencies, have not been unfruitful. All will rejoice in the prospect of having our winter service placed in better condition, the need of which was so painfully realised last winter.

THE DEAD ANIMALS NUISANCE.

During some years past complaints have arisen of dead animals, sometimes the bodies of cattle or horses, have been thrown upon the beaches or shores within the city limits. These putrefying carcases have created an intolerable nuisance to persons living in the vicinity, or even at considerable distances and in various directions according to the point of the compass from which the winds blows. This spring the offence has been repeated, and on remonstrance the offensive bodies have been partially, but very insufficiently covered with sand. This sort of thing cannot be tolerated and every offender ought to be sought out and punished. The law is plain, as witness the following extract from the City By-laws:

A by-law to prevent nuisances.

4. Any person guilty of throwing or sweeping dirt, or depositing rubbish, dead animals, or nuisance of any kind on the streets and squares, or on any part of the beach or shore, or wharf, or causing or permitting any offensive matter to run from any manufactory, slaughter house, butcher's shop, dung hill or pump, in any street or square, shall be liable to the penalties of the by-law.


The penalty of the by-law is thirty dollars or thirty days.

RESIGNATION OF MINISTER BLAIR.

An Ottawa despatch announces the resignation of Hon. A. G. Blair, Minister of Railways, and assigns as the cause his opposition to extending the Grand Trunk Pacific to Moncton. To this scheme of paralleling the Intercolonial from Quebec to Moncton it appears that the Government stands committed. There are many who do not see a sufficient reason for this costly duplication of the existing Government road, which would certainly deprive the latter of its through business. Difference of opinion in regard to this may or may not be the cause of Mr. Blair's resignation, but if this be the cause Mr. Blair will not stand alone in his opinion. And the Minister of Railways has many times shown that he has the courage of his opinions. What appears to be tolerably certain is that he has resigned.


And the break in the Cabinet must be regarded as a serious one. Mr. Blair was distinctly one of the strong men of the Laurier combination. Among the Premiers and ex-Premiers of provinces whom Mr. Laurier gathered about him on his advent to power there was no stronger man than the Premier of New Brunswick and if we except Sir Oliver Mowat there was none more influential, or conspicuous in the public eye than he. But a number of these have now dropped away. Sir Henry Jell of Quebec and Sir Oliver Mowat of Ontario both retired to governorships and the latter is since dead. Sir Louis Davies has become a Judge of the Supreme Court. Mr. Blair is the fourth of the ex-Premiers to go. Since he went to Ottawa Mr. Blair has been the sole representative of his Province in the cabinet, which before had always two cabinet ministers at Ottawa. The vacancy is therefore one that must be filled promptly. It is most probable that Hon. Henry R. Emmerson will be the successor, and no better choice could be made. From the Island point of view, because of his ability and character, and especially because of the deep interest he has always taken in improving the connection between the Island and the mainland Mr. Emmerson's promotion would be warmly welcomed.
