Continued from page 1.) Legislative Council. Mr. DOBIE, said he would not undertake to controvert the statements made on the other side as to the way the debt was increased. The House had been sitting nearly two months and very little done. There was a sense of relief when it was known that the budget was reached, but it brought the admission of another big deficit. Something was holding the business back. A Government should have the respect of the country but this could only be true where the Government followed honorable methods. He challenged the methods by which the Government had carried the late election. It was a glorious thing to think that the people were becoming more independent and exacting a higher standard of conduct for their public men. The sober second thought of the people was right and they were on every side withdrawing their support from the present Government. Outlay and income must be made to meet or taxes must be resorted to. He urged the necessity of economy and of getting a dollar's worth for every dollar expended. Down to No.
