



High Pressure Hunting

HE was a full grown hood Seal, about 8 feet long and about 600 pounds in weight. He was with a single cow. They killed the cow with their gaffs and the bull seal turned on them in fury. 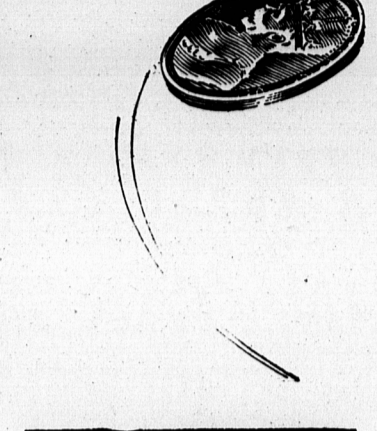

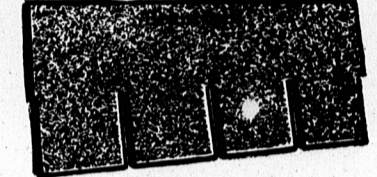
